PROPOSED VISIT OF THE PRO G. MASTER TO READING.

A LMOST at the eleventh hour the ceremony of setting the memorial stone of the new Municipal Buildings at Reading had to be deferred, in consequence of the illness—which all our readers must regret—of Lord Carnarvon. Bro. Robert Bradley, Provincial Grand Secretary of the Province of Berks and Bucks, lost no time in communicating the intelligence, and used every possible precaution to prevent inconvenience by sending, on Friday evening, the 10th inst., to every Mason in the Province a copy of the following notice :—

PROVINCE OF BERKS AND BUCKS.

In consequence of the sudden illness of Lord Carnarvon, the ceremony of laying the memorial stone of the Public Buildings in Reading, intended for Tuesday next, the 14th inst., is unavoidably postponed.

Lord Carnarvon is suffering from a very severe attack of goat, which makes it absolutely impossible for him to attend.

It is hoped that the ceremony may take place on or about Tnesday, the 4th November.

The Provincial Grand Lodge, summoned for the 14th October, will therefore not be held.

ROYAL MASONIC INSTITUTION FOR GIRLS.

A QUARTERLY General Court of the Governors and Subscribers of this Institution was held at Freemasons' Tavern, on Saturday last. Bro. Col. Creaton, Grand Treasurer, presided. After the reading and confirmation of the minutes Bro. Thos. Meggy, Vice-President, moved—

"That a Committee be appointed to consider the manner in which the scrutiny of the votes shall be made, both for the election of candidates and for other purposes, and to report to the next General Court."

Several times, within the last few years a scrutiny of votes has been demanded, after the poll was declared, and such scrutiny has disclosed the fact that the declaration had been incorrect. There was evidently some laxity somewhere, and possibly the arrangements were slightly at fault. If a Committee was appointed to consider the 8 Priestley, Julie S, H.

His proposition, he said, was intended to assimilate the form of voting for Secretary to that of voting for children to the Institution. At present the voting for Secretary was by personal attendance in London, which involved heavy exponse on the provincial brethien. From his own province (Lancashire) it would cost a Life Governor £3, and as there were 3,000 Life Governors of the Boys' School this would represent an outlay of £9,000, which he thought would be better invested if given to one of the Institutions. It was said that there was a jealousy on the part of the London brethren on this question, but if there was, it was unbecoming of such a universal brotherhood. He did not believe there was this jealousy; the only jealousy there should be was an emulation in benevolent work. It was urged that if the provinces had the power of voting by proxy papers they might put forward an inefficient candidate, and thus sacrifice the Institution. He could assure the Court that the provincial brethron had a lively interest in the Institutions, and were not likely to sacrifice them. If they did, it was impossible that all the provinces could be united against London. He hoped the brethren would make the fair and just concession he asked to the brethren of the provinces. After the motion had been seconded by Bro. John Constable, it was carried by a majority of twelve.

Bro. H. Smith, Provincial Grand Secretary of West Yorkshire, gave notice that he would move, at the Quarterly Court in January, that the Court accept the sum of 1000 guineas from West Yorkshire for the purchase of a perpetual presentation for the Province. Bro. Louis Hirsch gave notice of motion for the Quarterly Court in January, in the words of the above-mentioned rejected motion of Bro. Thomas Meggy. The election of eighteen girls out of a list of forty-eight was then taken, and, at the declaration of the poll, the following was announced as the result :--

ROYAL MASONIC INSTITUTION FOR BOYS.

THE Quarterly Meeting of the Governors and Subscribers of the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys was held in the large Hall at Freemasons' Tavern, on Monday, Bro. Col. Creaton, Grand Treasurer, in the chair. The motion by Bro. Thos. Meggy, Vice-Patron :-

"That a committee be appointed to consider the manner in which 4 1 the scrutiny of the votes shall be made, both for the election of candidates and for other purposes, and to report to the next General Court,'

was first discussed. Bro. Moggy submitted that inacouracies had been discovered on several occasions in the work of the Scrutineers, $\mathbf{24}$ and he wished a Committee to inquire whether a mode of scrutiny of votes differing from the present mode could not be adopted. The Rev. A. F. A. Woodford thought there was the great objection to the 29 motion that it had been rejected on Saturday in the Girls' Institu-22tion, and it was desirable that there should be uniformity in all the 18 Masonic Charities. Bro. Raynham Stewart bore testimony to the care, honesty and fairness with which the Scrutineers had always 10 42performed their work. Bro. A. H. Tattershall thought that parties 62 bringing forward such a motion should act as Scrutineers themselves, and see how the work was generally done. Mistakes occurred some-72times, but they generally arose from new brethren being on the scrutiny who were not used to the work. Bro. Meggy said he wished 11 19 to be a Scrutineer himself, and it was in consequence of that that he 27 had brought forward this motion. On a division the motion was lost. 38The Rev. A. F. A. Woodford, in the absence of Bro. F. C. Matier, 61 moved the omission of the word "consecutive" after the word 17 "seven" in Law 55 of the Institution, line 3. The motion being in-44 tended to qualify a candidate if his father should have subscribed 57 to one or other of the Masonic Institutions seven years in all, instead 51 of seven consecutive years as at present laid down by the rules of 32 the Institution. Bro. Woodford said that, without going into this 55 question, as the Girls' School allowed the subscription for seven 73 years to be for an aggregate seven, it was not advisable that there should be a different system in the Boys' School. On the ground of 15 the desirability of uniformity he brought forward this motion. Bro. 41 R. B. Webster seconded the motion. Bro. W. Roebuck opposed it on 36 the principle that the Boys' School and the Girls' School were in dif-13 ferent positions, there being more candidates and fewer vacancies in -69 the former than there were in the latter. Many Masons attended 26 Lodge for four or five years, and then did not belong to any Lodge at 39 all for many years before their death. The children of such Masons frequently pushed out the children of deserving and energetic Masons -33 50 at these elections. The Rev. A. F. A. Woodford said it did not fol-54low, because there were more candidates and fewer vacancies now in 25the Boys' School than in the Girls' that it would always be so. There 35 had been occasions when the contrary was the case, and it might 48 happen again. The motion was then carried by a majority of 19. 76 Bro. James A. Birch moved an alteration of Rule 71, sub-section 2, as 46 follows: 75

" "The election and removal of the Secretary shall be vested in the General Committee; the voting to be by balloting papers duly forwarded to each qualified member not less than fourteen days before the date of election ; such balloting papers must be signed by the party entitled thereto, and may be presented by a member of the General Committee, on his or her behalf, at the time of the election."

After repeating his statements made at the Quarterly Court of the Girls' School on Saturday, he said the Province of East Lancashire trusted it would be many years before they would be called upon to exercise the privilege they sought, for the eloquent advocacy of Bro. Binckes had tended to extend the prosperity of this and other Institutions. He had awakened in the hearts of the brethren the feelings which led to the prosperity of the Masonic Institutions, and he trusted that it would be many years before he was removed from the office of Secretary by any cause. Bro. Binckes sincerely sympathised with the afflictions of the fatherless and widows, and there was no one more eloquent or able to plead their cause. Bro. Rayn. ham Stewart thought it inexpedient to make any alteration in the present law, after it should be framed by a committee with due consideration. Bro. H. Smith Provincial Grand Secretary of West Yorkshire, supported the proposition of Bro. Birch, and said that the privilege, if granted, would be used with caution, and that the London brethren, while taking nothing from themselves, would be giving a great deal to the Provinces. Bro. Binckes, replying to Bro. Stewart, said the expense of printing and posting the balloting papers would perhaps be £25, but as the election of Secretary would not be likely to recur every year he did not think the question of expense should be allowed to weigh in the consideration of the question. Bro. James A. Birch, in summing up, said the benefits of the Institution were not confined to any locality, and the interest felt in the Institution should be co-extensive with its benefits. The provincial brethren wished to exercise a privilege for the benefit of the Institu. tion without the additional tax of the journey to London and the loss that he ha of two days' time being imposed on them. The motion was then movement.

Main J. These ceremonies were rendered by Bro. James Terry P.Z. in his customary perfect and impressive manner. newly appointed M.E.Z. invested his Officers as follows :- Comps. W. THE GREAT CITY LODGE, No. 1426.

ONCE more the time has come round for the regular installation him. The next toast he had to propose was one that was always meeting of this Lodge, and age chronicling the doings of the members of the famous "Great City," and recording the advance in office of the various members who, in the few years that have clapsed since its foundation, have so materially contributed towards the work of conducting its affairs, and have thereby been the means of raising it to its present high position. mony up to the formation of the Board of Installed Masters, when, in the presence of a large assembly of Masters and Past Masters, the newly installed Master of The Great City Lodge was placed in the chair of K.S. and, having been saluted in ancient form, received the congratulations of those amongst whose numbers he had been onrolled. The remaining part of the ceremony was ably completed by Bro. Past Master Headon, assisted by Bro. H. Catchpole S.W., Thomas Hamer J.W., Rev. R. J. Simpson P.G.C. Chaplain, N. B. Headon P.M. Treasarer, Edward Moody P.M. Sccretary, Charles Taylor S.D., W. F. Kibble J.D., F. T. C. Keeble I.G., G. Jenkins Organist, W. Baber D.C., R. Fendick and F. W. Potter Stewards, and W. Steedman P.M. Tyler. Propositions for initiation were taken, and the petitions of two distressed brethren considered, with the result of relief being afforded from the Samaritan Fund. Lodge having been closed, the brethren proceeded to the Great Hall of the Hotel, where the customary banquet awaited them. The festivities of the day were ably presided over by the newly appointed W.M., who throughout the evening successfully directed his efforts to bring the meeting to an early conclusion, at the same time taking care that all assembled should thoroughly enjoy themselves. At the conclusion of the banquet, grace (Non Nobis Domine) was sung by the musical artistes ; and then the W.M., in brief terms, introduced the usual Loyal toasts. He considered that the Prince of Wales deserved their especial esteem, by reason of the great interest he took in the Craft, and in all that concerned the welfare of Freemasonry. With the health of the Pro G.M., the Deputy G.M., and the rest of the Grand Officers, Bro. Blackie had the pleasure of being able to couple the names of two distinguished members of that body-Bros. Fenn and Simpson. Bro. Fenn, in replying to the toast, after tendering his thanks, said that he had been a Grand Officer for upwards of fifteen years, during which time he had always found the members of Grand Lodge ready to undertake their duties with cheerfulness, although at times they were of a somewhat ardnous nature. He missed one Grand Officer from the meeting who might perhaps he said to have done more for the Craft than any other, and who, he thought, had won the esteem of all with whom he had had dealings. He referred to their esteemed Grand Secretary, Bro. John Hervey, who he considered one of the few remaining links between Freemasonry of the past and present generations. Bro. Fenn then proceeded to dilate on his connection with the Emulation Lodge of Improvement, in connection with which Bro. Hervey had for very many years past occupied a prominent position. Bro. Fenn next referred to the work just issued by Bro. James Stevens, Past Master of this Lodge, advocating some steps being taken towards ensuring a greater uniformity in the ritual. Brother the Rev. R. J. Simpson Past G. Ch. followed, and tendered his thanks. Bro. James Freeman next rose. He had great pleasure in introducing the toast he was about to propose, that of the W.M. of The Great City Lodge. He was sure there was not a member present but was glad to see Bro. Blackie in the position of W.M. He had been connected with the Lodge since its consecration, and no one had worked harder than he. Bro. Freeman felt that, however good others who had filled the chair may have been, Bro. Blackie would go far to improve on them; he was also convinced that the brethren would support him, and co-operate in ensuring the success of the Lodge during the coming year as cordially as they had in the past. The W.M., after thanking the brethren, said he could assure them that, since the time he was first connected with the Lodge, which was at its consecration, and when he was scated with the collar of junior officer of the Lodge, he determined that his duties, in whatever position he might be placed, should be performed as near perfection as possible. The way in which he had advanced year by year led him to believe that he had succeeded in satisfying the respective Masters and the brothren also. The compliment of electing him as W.M. was the greatest the mem. bers could offer, and he hoped his deeds in the future would be of such a nature as to warrant the confidence that had been reposed in

Bro. Poore was next called on. Having taken a small share in the instruction of some of the Officers he naturally felt anxious to see what they did. improving. Bro. G. Thistle Thorne also responded to the toast. The W.M. next proposed the health of the Immediate Past Master, the Installing Master, and the Past Masters. Plant, Moulding, and Higgins, and then the W.M. proceeded with the usual Loyal and Masonic toasts. The first on the list, as usual, was that of the Queen, coupled with success to the Craft. This was followed by the National Anthem, and then was given the toast of the M.W. the Grand Master of England H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. Beer had performed his daty most efficiently, and to show their esteem they had subscribed among themselves for a testimonial, in the form of a Past Master's jewel, which he now had the pleasure, on their behalf, of presenting to Bro. Beer, with the sincere wish of the brethren that he might live long to wear it, and assist the Royal Military Lodge with his advice and support. Bro. Edwin Beer, on rising to respond, was received with applause, he briefly thanked the W.M. and brothren for their expressions of good feeling. Throughout his year of office he had endeavoured to carry out his duties to the best of his ability, and when he was convinced that he had done so to the satisfaction of the members generally, he was extremely gratified. Douglass had, he said, by installing him that evening, conferred on him the greatest honour it was possible to receive from a Lodge. He had very great pleasure in carrying out the wishes of the brethren and investing Bro. Douglass with the Past Master's jewel which Douglass in had been voted from the Lodge Funds. Bro. acknowledgment tendered his hearty thanks. If the way in which he had performed the ceremony of installation that evening had met the approval of the Lodge he was highly gratified. He hoped the brothren were satisfied with what he had done for the Lodge during the past twolve months; the very handsome jewel they had presented to him led him to believe that such was the case; and for it and their support during the term of his Mastership, he tendered the heartiest thanks. Bro. Scales now proposed the health of the Past Masters; the toast was one that had been so often proposed, and the brethren it included were so well known, it was quite unnecessary to dilate long on their merits; he hoped the brethren who had occupied the chair of the Lodge in years past would for a long time to come be found in their respective places in the Lodge, where they would always command, and, he felt sure, roceive the greatest respect. to Bro. Scales on his promotion to the chair of his Mother Lodge and likewise the Lodge on having so early initiated a brother who had proved himself capable in performing the various duties he had undertaken. It was a great satisfaction to the Past Masters to see the brethren they had initiated fill the chairs of the Lodge. Bro. Michael considered that his office of Secretary was one requiring him to write rather than speak. He was pleased to see the Lodge in the position to which it had risen, and pointed out the great credit that attached to the members in having so zealously supported the Charities on each opportunity that had arisen since the Lodge was consecrated. He thought the idea of giving up one of the banquets, and devoting the money that would thus have been spent was a good one, and hoped that, should the present Master see fit to adopt such a course during his year of office, the members would attend in as great a number as usual, and show they were really sincere in their support of the Institutions. He should ask each brother, on some future occasion, to put a few shillings towards making the Lodge a Vice-President of the various Charities. Bro. Kingham followed; in a few words mainly supporting Bro. Michael's plan for placing the Lodge in the prond position of Vice-President of the Institutions. Bro. Scales now proposed the health of the initiates. The two received that evening were worthy brethren, and likely to advance the interests of the Lodge. Bro. Rooks thanked the members; he greatly appreciated the compliment that had been paid him in receiving him into the Lodge. Bro. Connolly likewise thanked the brethren. The W.M. proposed the health of the Visitors, calling upon Bro. Dubois to respond. That brother, on behalf of himself and fellow Visitors, expressed the gratification they felt at hearing that the rule in the Lodge had been for each Master to instal his successor; he considered such a course was of great benefit to a Lodge, and any brother who thus finished his year of office was entitled to greater honour than could otherwise accrue to him. Bro. Brown followed, finished complimenting the Lodge on its efficient Officers; he should endeavour to emulate their example, and point them out as ern for young brethren to copy. Bro. Cherry also re-The toast of the Charities followed, Bro. Terry responding. a pattern for young brethren to copy. plied. He arged the brethren to support their Master in the laudable endeavour he had promised to make to place the Lodge among the V. P.'s of the Benevolent Institution, this was a position attained by only 30 of the 1845 Lodges on the roll of English Grand Lodge, and the fact of so young a Lodge as the Metropolitan qualifying itself would reflect the greatest credit on all connected with it. The next toast was that of the Treasurer, Secretary, and other Officers of the Lodge, which was heartily proposed and responded to by each of the A Weekly Record of Masonic Intelligence. Sanctioned by the Officers there present, all of whom expressed their intention to work in their new offices as much for the benefit of the Lodge as was possible. The Tyler's toast followed, and thus the proceedings terininated.

After the reading of the minutes of the last regular meeting and an emergency meeting, and confirmation of the same, the ballot was taken for Bros. E. W. Dubois and Cannon as joining members; the ballot was then taken for four gentlemen for initiation-Messrs. Elliott, Thorn, Holliday, and Boyle, which being unanimous they were admitted, and duly initiated into the mysterics and privileges of ancient Freemasonry. Considerable interest attached to the initiation of Mr. Boyle, who is the Consul representing the Republic of Liberia at Sierra Leone, and is a native of the latter colony. The W.M. then left the chair, which was taken by Bro. Mark S. Larlham P.M. M.E.Z., for the purpose of proceeding with the installation. Bro. Dubois W.M. then presented Bro. II. Lovegrove S.W. W.M. elect, who assented to the usual charges, and having been obligated, the brethren below the rank of Installed Master retired. A Board of Installed Masters was then formed, with Bros. Dixon as S.W., Stiles as J.W., Ramsey as I.G.; and Bro. Henry Lovogrove was installed into the chair of K.S. according to ancient form. The new W.M. having declared the Board of Installed Masters closed, the brothren were admitted, and saluted him in the three degrees, after which the addresses were very ably given by the Installing Officer. The Officers were then invested as follows :--Bros. G. Clark jun. S.W., Harry Clark J.W., C. C. Cruikshanks S.D., F. J. Perks J.D., W. S. Dankley I.G., W. Heelis D.C., T. G. W. Wood W.S., G. S. Graham Org., and J. Daly Tyler. The retiring W.M. was invested as I.P.M., and Bro. H. B. Marshall, C.C., F.R.G.S. was invested as Treasurer, the W.M. alluding to his re-election to that office, and his liberality to the Masonic Charities during the past year. A letter was read from Bro. H. C. Levander Prov. Grand Secretary, announcing that the M.W. Pro. Grand Master had consented to the removal of the Lodge to the Albany Hotel, at Twickenbam, an announcement which was received with much pleasure by the brethren. After receiving some names for initiation, and passing a vote of thanks to the Installing Officer for his services, the Lodge was closed in due Bro. Willing in replying tendered his congratulations form. The retiring W.M. declined to accept any recognition of his services until the Lodge had been longer established. At seven o'clock the members and visitors assembled at the banquet at the Red Lion Hotel. The printed list of toasts was appropriately embellished with texts from Shakspeare, arranged by the W.M. The usual Loyal and Masonic toasts were given by the W.M. Bro. H. Lovegrove. Those of the Prov. G.M. Col. F. Burdett and the Provincial Grand Lodge being especially well received. The latter was responded to by the I.P.M., who, owing to the meetings of other Lodges, was the only Provincial Grand Officer present. The health of the W.M. was proposed by the I.P.M. who alluded to the energy shown by him in the formation and working of the Lodge. W.M. thanked the brethren for the hearty manner in which they had received the toast, and proposed that of the I.P.M., who had skillfully managed the affairs of the Lodge. Bro. G. Clark S.W. suitably responded for the Officers. In proposing the health of the initiates, the W.M. made some pleasing remarks about their private life, as two of them had been known to him for some years, and their initiate from Africa for over sixteen years. Bro. Stiles W.M. of the Kings Cross Lodge responded on behalf of the Visitors, and congratulated the W.M. on his advancement, also on the Officers who had been appointed by him. As the time for the departure of the last train approached, the Tyler's toast was given, and the brethren departed after spending a very pleasant evening.

Anyhow, three Lodges have already located themselves at No. 23 for their usual monthly meetings—Walpole taking the initiative (with a splendid opening last Thursday evening), followed by Cabbell and Perseverance, and it is expected Social and Sincerity will come in shortly, and, may be, the aristocratic Union ; this latter, however, we doubt, unless his lordship smiles benignly and says yes. Provincial Grand Lodge this year is also to be held in this house, and as the ruling powers are going in strictly for economy, and do not intend advertising in the local press, we give their announcement free, gratis, for nothing. G.M. will preside. Tickets 11/ each (to include half a bottle of champagne), to be obtained of W. Bro. James Dunsford P.P.G.S.D., St. Giles' street, Norwich, and of Bro. H. A. Wooster Reeves, No. 23 St. Giles'-street, Norwich, not later than Tuesday, the 14th inst."

Touching this migration to "Cooper's," we have received a letter from "A Mason," protesting against holding a Masonic banquet "under the roof of the greatest Athenst in the Eastern Counties, when we have such respectable hotels in our m.dst." These hotels are many of them Lodge houses, held by brethren, who naturally feel aggrieved that they should be passed over in favour of one-however good a caterer—who reviles at religion, and holds Freemasonry in contempt. The matter has created some stir among the Craft in the Province.

"UNIFORMITY OF MASONIC RITUAL AND OBSERVANCE."

To the Editor of the FREEMASON'S CHRONICLE.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER,-The only unfavourable critique of the above work I have yet seen is that of your contemporary, The Freemason, in its number of the 11th inst. I should be sorry to attribute this to any other than a fair expression of opinion were it not for circumstances known to myself and relating to the existence of press rivalry. Nor should I notice it at all but for assertions which are not warranted by fact, and which, if uncontradicted, might materially influence for evil the decision of the question at issue. The first of these assertions is fully answered at pages 93-95 of the work itself, wherein is set out the difference of opinion of The Freemason in 1878 from that expressed by the same publication in 1870. What in the earlier year was designated "a great movement, deserving the serious attention of every thoughtful Mason," is now condemned as "meddlesome interference;" what then had "long been a source of mortification and pain to witness," it is now alike "unnecessary and uncalled for" to attempt to remedy. "The promulgation of an 'orthodox,' and unchangeable ritual," which was then "one of the most desirable reforms," would now be "atterly injurious to industry and energy in our Officers, and to true and educated and sensible Freemasons." What was then " a strange anomaly," is now "a-allowable difference." "The modest request which we are sure will be granted by Grand Lodge," now reads "we feel persnaded ourselves that G.and Lodge will never consent to any such proposition." Is this consistency? Does it warrant the statement, "We have never changed our opinion on this vexua quastio?" Whilst I wrote on this subject in the pages of The Freemason, was ever a worl printed adverse to the arguments 1 then advanced? On the contrary, the correspondent who is now credited with "zeal which, in our opinion, outruns his discretion, then "indicated a remedy which we believe would prove effectual." I could quote and quote to prove this glaring evidence of inconsistency, and also of many other departures from the truly Masonic manuer in which your contemporary was originally conducted, sotting aside altogether its late extraordingly articles wherein inverted conmas shield slang epithets which are abasive of the Order it professes to represent, but oni bono? It will not be through the influe ce of The Freemason, or any other journal, that he "great movewill have ultimate success, but through the sterring good mert' sense of the intelligent port on of the brotherhood represented by the met bers of the Grand Lodge itsel. My work is but a preparation for still great r efforts in that direction, and I am daily favoured by communications from all parts of the kingdom which will strengthen and increase my z al without, as I believe and hope, lessening my discr tion. I am not the first, nor shall I be the last, whom certain editors have deemed indiscreet because their opinions are ontra. geously opposed to any project not of their own introduction; but all powerful as the fourth estate may be, there are yet tribuuals before which submission must be made if the judgment acrived at is a , roper one. To such a trybunal amorgst Masons I am about to app al, well supported, I hope, by able and intelligent men, who see the errors I see and what they are leading to, and I await the result, whatever it may be, with a sound conviction that the requirem remedy will be, if not as scon as practicable, yet, a so distant date carried into effect. 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
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
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
