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## OUR THIRTY-SIXTH VOLUME. -

ANOTHER milestone is passed on our road through life, and we thank the many members of the Craft who have helped us to complete our thirty-fifth stage, and start upon a thirty-sixth. Our progress in the particular branch of Freemasonry to which we devote special attention is marked by the amount of the support accorded us, and gauged by this standard we have good reason to congratulate ourselves on having given satisfaction. But we are ambitious, we aim at doing more than to merely give satisfaction—we desire to become a greater power in Freemasonry than we have been in the past. We are egotistical enough to believe that we have often made our voice heard in Freemasonry, and have initiated reforms which are to-day bearing good fruit, and are being accepted as the natural surroundings of English Freemasonry, and to continue to do so will be our aim. We can only hope our desires may be fully realised. We need hardly say we shall strive to use the power we possess for the good of Freemasonry, or that we shall take care to avoid any abuse of the privileges we enjoy; we have a past record to point to, and we feel it speaks far more eloquently of our principles than any professions or promises can do, and for this reason we confidently start our THIRTY-SIXTH VOLUME with the desire that it shall be judged on its merits, rather than by any boastful programme which we can issue as to its probable contents.

## THE BOYS' SCHOOL FESTIVAL.

THE last of the 1892 Anniversary Festivals of the Craft Institutions has passed with a result that allows of the heartiest congratulations being given, not only to each of the great Charities primarily interested, but also to the general body of the Craft, which certainly deserves the credit of having loyally supported the Central Institutions of Freemasonry during the year, thereby allowing the work of provision for the aged, for the widow, and the orphan, in distress among us, to be proceeded with without anxiety or trouble during the twelvemonth. The 94th Anniversary Festival of the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys was held on Wednesday, under the presidency of the Provincial Grand Master for Gloucestershire, Sir Michael E. Hicks-Beach, Bart.,

and realised subscriptions which the Secretary was able to announce at the Festival then reached a total of £12,212, which sum has been subsequently increased by supplementary donations. The result of this Festival makes the returns of the year for the three Institutions certain to exceed £90,000, a total which it must be admitted is most gratifying to all concerned in the welfare of our Institutions.

We have already said that the result of Wednesday's Festival was satisfactory from a financial point of view, but the extent of this satisfaction can only be fully measured by a survey of all the surroundings; and the more attention we devote to the matter in this direction the more gratifying must appear the announcement of Wednesday. Going back to the corresponding Festival of last year we find that, as the result of the special effort then made on behalf of "Our Boys," £29,000 was subscribed. It was largely anticipated that this special success would make itself felt when the returns of the succeeding Festival came to be made up, and although we have not been among those who anticipated a tremendous falling off in the returns of 1892 as the result of the special success of 1891, we have recognised there was some foundation for the fears of those who thought it would make a difference detrimental to the Institution. As far as we are individually concerned, we have all along anticipated that the enthusiasm of 1891 would continue in such force as to make its mark on the returns of 1892, and we are happy in the knowledge that our anticipations have been fully realised. There can be no question that the 1892 return of the Boys' School is a grand success, judged from any standpoint, but when viewed in connection with the Festival of 1891 it stands out exceptionally brilliant, and should satisfy the most exacting as to the sympathy of the Craft in the work of this Institution, and the confidence reposed in its present management.

When, a few days back, we specially referred to the then approaching Festival, and made a feature of the item in the programme of the executive which has reference to the removal of the School, there were some who considered we were touching a point outside the actual surroundings of the Festival, and one which it was quite unnecessary to associate with the momentary question of finance. We cannot look upon this subject in any such light. The whole question of removal must be regarded as a special feature in connection with the Institution, and its desirability as well as its practicability can only be determined by taking into consideration the approval and the enthusiasm of the Craft in this direction—as marked by the amount of their subscriptions. It is probable that at least 95 per cent. of those who have helped to supply the total of £12,212 announced on Wednesday were acquainted with the wish, which is now firmly rooted in the minds of the principal workers for the Boys' School,

to remove the home of the pupils to a more desirable site on the earliest opportunity. With such a momentous question requiring consideration in the near future can it be supposed they lost sight of the possible use that might be made of the sum they were about to give? We think not. We are rather inclined to the belief that support of the 1892 Festival implied agreement with the programme now before the Craft, and, in a measure, pledged the donors to take more than a passive interest in this absorbing topic of the future, which, as we recently pointed out, is in reality a test question—one on which the management of the Charity must either rise or fall when once its consideration is seriously started upon. On such a basis, then, we argue that the prospect of an early removal is regarded with favour throughout the Craft, and a speedy consummation of the proposals made in this direction should be one of the outcomes of the success of the Festival of 1892.

The Chairman of the day was supported by a Board of 306 Stewards, of whom 108 represented London Lodges, and 198 Provincial ones, the total contributions, with additions since received, reaching a sum of £12,224 10s, of which £3,754 15s 6d was collected by the London representatives, and £8,469 14s 6d by the country Stewards. This very unequal division of contributions between London and the Provinces is, at least, a peculiarity, and we know of no reason that can be assigned for so unusual a state of affairs, unless it be that London Lodges are not, as a rule, in session during the three months preceding the Boys' School Festival, and as a consequence there is less opportunity for the Stewards to make personal canvass on behalf of the Fund for which they are working. This, it must be admitted, is no imaginary drawback, when it is borne in mind that the Boys' School Festivals are hardly thought of during the earlier portion of the year, the attention of the Craft being then devoted to the earlier fixtures—on behalf of the Benevolent Institution and the Girls' School. But if London appears to disadvantage the Provincial brethren have thrown themselves nobly into the work, and by their splendid efforts have made the absolute result one of which all can be proud. But London Craftsmen must not suppose the Provincials are always going to do this for them. Each division has its share of work to perform, and if those shares are not actually equal, they are at least much nearer so than has been made manifest on this occasion; but we hope that in the effort to place matters more nearly on an equitable footing it will be the Londoners who will make all the variation—we should be very sorry to see our Provincial brethren desiring to come down to the level of the metropolis.

The place of honour among the contributing Provinces very appropriately falls to the Chairman's district of Gloucestershire, the Stewards from which collected upwards of £1,600, as compared with £500 with which they supported their chief on the first occasion on which he presided at one of the Festivals, and £1,000 which they contributed in connection with his second chairmanship. THE ninety-fourth Anniversary Festival of the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys may be said to have been inaugurated last Saturday, when, by the kind invitation of Bro. George Everett P.G. Treasurer, the annual athletic sports were held at Kempton Park. A large number of Subscribers, Life Governors, the Committee and Brethren went down by the various special trains to the pleasant Surrey Park, and, being favoured by fine weather, the games were a great success. On Tuesday the distribution of prizes took place at the School, at Wood Green, and again a large number of friends assembled to witness the excellent entertainment given by the Boys, and the presentation of the rewards to the successful competitors by Lady Lucy Hicks-Beach. The Festival proper was held on Wednesday, at the Freemasons' Tavern, under the presidency of the Right Hon. Sir Michael E. Hicks-Beach, Bart., Rt. Worshipful Provincial Grand Master for Gloucestershire, who was supported by the following brethren:—J. C. Remington D.G.M. New South Wales, Spencer Charrington, Baron de Ferrieres, R. V. Vassar-Smith, Rev. H. A. Pickard, George Plucknett, Rev. P. H. Smith, Captain J. D. Murray, H. B. Marshall, Richard Eve, Geo. Everett, Edward Letchworth, W. A. Scurrah, S. J. Attenborough, Rev. H. A. Hebb, Asher Barfield, Capt. S. G. Homfray, C. E. Koyser, Robert Willoughby, J. S. Cumberland, J. M. Scarlett, William Webber, W. M. Foxcroft, John Glass, George Corble, Dr. W. E. Dring, A. Clemow, R. J. Weston, William Pile, J. Easterbrook, Dr. Naunton Davies, James Terry, F. R. W. Hedges, J. Morrison McLeod, the energetic Secretary, and many others, including a large number of ladies, the total company being about 350.

At the conclusion of the banquet the Right Hon. Chairman proposed the usual Loyal toasts, and in referring to the recent heavy affliction of the Royal Family said that Freemasonry had established a bond of sympathy between the brethren and the Grand Master that had done much to alleviate his sorrow. With regard to the Grand Officers, Lord Lathom and he were boys together at Eton, and he had known him intimately even since; he was deservedly popular, and the Craft were fortunate in having such a man as Pro Grand Master. The Earl of Mount Edgecumbe was also highly esteemed, and with the rest of the Grand Officers had done much to promote the Charities. Bro. Capt. J. D. Murray, Grand Treasurer, acknowledged the toast, and said that they would always do the best they could to further the cause to which they belonged. In proposing the toast of the evening, Success to the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys, the chairman said that a rather inconvenient time had been chosen for the Festival, as there was something going on in the country that prevented several brethren from being present, but he was pleased to see the Festival so well supported. Whatever their differences in politics Freemasonry brought the brethren together, and they always mustered strongly wherever the cause of charity required them. The Institution was founded nearly a hundred years ago for the maintenance of half a dozen boys,

and since that time 1978 sons of Freemasons had been educated by its means, and there were at present 250 under its care. It might well be said that, like the kindred institutions, it was an honour to the Craft and had practically led the van in the matter of free education. The result was highly satisfactory, as was proved by the excellent results obtained at the public examinations. The Benevolent Institution appealed to our sympathy for the Old People, the Girls appealed to our chivalry, but the Boys appealed to our brotherhood, as they might become Masons hereafter. The Craft were deeply indebted to those able brethren who presided at the Board of Management and who had devoted so much of their time in reorganising the Institution. He had been most pleased with his visit to Wood Green on the previous day, and congratulated all on the success achieved in the play ground. He therefore appealed most strongly for means to carry on this noble work, the ordinary annual expenditure being £11,500, while their only reliable income was £930. There were certain other matters that the Board of Management would like to undertake, but they were crippled for funds, and the question would soon have to be faced whether it would not be advisable to remove the School to some more open spot. He had said enough to recommend the Institution to their sympathy; it was honestly and ably managed, and he begged each brother to give just a little more than he intended in order to extend its sphere of action. Bro. George Plucknett, Treasurer and Vice-Patron of the Institution for 25 years, responded, and stated that there never was a time when the School was so well managed as at present, so that there was every prospect of their future success. The education given was a credit to the Institution and of the utmost importance to the boys in after life. The Secretary read out the list of the amounts brought in by the various Stewards, of whom there were 306, London being represented by 109 Lodges, and the Provinces by 197 Lodges; the total amount subscribed being £12,212. The reading of the list was received with hearty and continuous applause, which culminated in a burst of cheering when the total was announced.

The Rev. H. A. Pickard Grand Chaplain, in felicitous terms proposed the health of the Chairman, who, in reply, stated that he had now presided at Festivals in connection with all the three Institutions. On the first occasion his Province (Gloucestershire), represented by 15 Lodges, had contributed £500, on the second occasion they had increased their support to £1,000, but to night they had recognised the duty of contributing to the Masonic Charities by sending in £1,600. Bro. J. C. Remington Deputy Grand Master of New South Wales responded for the Visitors, and said he was fortunate beyond measure in being able to attend the Festival. He had witnessed the prize distribution, and had seen the noble school with its 250 smiling and healthy boys. The success achieved at the examinations reflected credit upon the management and honour upon the Craft, and he should certainly carry back with him to Australia very pleasant impressions of the evening's gathering.

Bro. C. E. Keyser, in submitting the other Masonic Charities, mentioned the splendid result obtained by the Benevolent Institution last February, when £67,000 was contributed, and hoped that in the future, as in the past, they would be able to carry out the work undeterred by lack of funds. Bro. James Terry Secretary of the Benevolent Institution replied, and pointed with pardonable pride to the fact that this year alone the brethren had contributed £89,794 to the three Institutions. Where is the other organisation that can produce such a result? Bro. Capt. S. G. Homfray D.P.G.M. Monmouth, proposed the Stewards of the day, which was acknowledged by Bro. R. V. Vassar-Smith D.P.G.M. Gloucestershire, and the toast of the Ladies, given by the Grand Secretary, brought the interesting proceedings to a successful and pleasant termination. The company then adjourned to the Temple, where an excellent entertainment was given, under the direction of Bro. E. P. Delevanti, in which Mr. Barker, Miss Agnes Larkcom, Madame Florence Winn, Miss Kate Flynn, Miss Emily Foxcroft, together with Bros. Franklin Clive, Reginald Groome, Arthur Thomas, and Signor Alsepi took part.

## MASONIC SERVICE.

THE Freemasons of Southport, together with many visiting brethren, including Bro. J. D. 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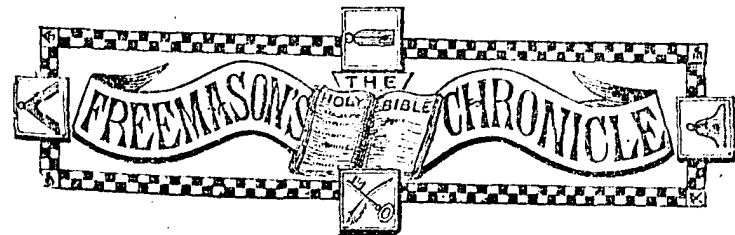

## PROV. GRAND LODGE OF SUFFOLK.

THE annual Provincial Grand Lodge of Suffolk was held at the Bath Hotel, Felixstowe, on Wednesday, 22nd ult., under the banner of the Felix Lodge, No. 2371. The Provincial Grand Master, Lord Henniker, was unfortunately

unable to be present in consequence of medical advice, and in his absence the Deputy Provincial Grand Master (Rev. C. J. Martyn) presided, supported on his right by Bro. Hamond le Strange D.P.G.M. Norfolk P.G.D. England. Brother J. M. Canova P.P.G.S.W. acted as Deputy Provincial Grand Master. The Deputy Grand Master having opened the Lodge, the roll of the Provincial Grand Officers, and also of the Lodges, was called, the whole of the latter, with the exception of the Adair, 936 (Aldeburgh), responding. The Clarence Lodge (Clare) invited the Provincial Grand Lodge to visit them next year. Bro. T. Hodgson P.M. 71 was unanimously elected Treasurer for the year. The report of the Board of General Purposes, which was confirmed, referred to the satisfactory progress Masonry was making in the Province, the returns showing a net gain, after deducting deaths, resignations, and exclusions, of 20. It was recommended that 20 guineas be voted to the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys, and 20 guineas for the Girls. The report of the Suffolk Masonic Charity Association alluded with satisfaction to the fact that £1,464 had been contributed this year in the Province towards the three Charities—the largest amount ever subscribed in one year. The brethren afterwards marched in procession, in full Masonic clothing, headed by the band of the 4th Hussars, to the church of SS. Peter and Paul, where divine service was held, the choir of St. Mary Eims, Ipswich (through the arrangements of Bro. H. J. Wright), leading the choral portion, which was most effectively rendered. The sermon was preached by the Rev. J. H. Pilkington, one of the newly appointed Provincial Grand Chaplains. On returning the Lodge was resumed, and the Deputy Provincial Grand Master briefly addressed the brethren, expressing deep regret at the unavoidable absence of the Provincial Grand Master, and speaking with great satisfaction of the steady progress Masonry was making in the Province of Suffolk. Alluding to the report of the Suffolk Charity Association, he said he was glad to find that during the past year the Province had surpassed itself, and he hoped before the whole of the lists closed the £1,460 which had already been contributed would be made up to the round number of £1,500. He gave a cordial welcome to the Deputy Provincial Grand Master of Norfolk (Bro. Hamond le Strange), of whose Masonic work he spoke in eulogistic terms. Bro. le Strange gave hearty good wishes from the Province of Norfolk. On the motion of Bro. Cheston, seconded by Bro. Tracy, a vote of thanks was accorded to the vicar of Felixstowe and the clergy who took part in the service at the Church, and also to the Prov. Grand Chaplain for his admirable sermon. The offertory was given to the sick and needy of Felixstowe and Walton. A banquet followed, at which nearly all the brethren were present, and which without doubt has never been equalled in the choice of the most seasonable viands and the splendid way in which it was served, in the annals of Provincial Grand Lodge gatherings; and it bore the mark of the great personal interest Bro. H. G. Quilter took in the meeting. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master, who presided, at the conclusion of the repast gave the toasts of the Queen and Craft, the Most Worshipful the Grand Master H.R.H. Prince of Wales, the M.W. Pro Grand Master the Earl of Lathom,

the R.W. Deputy Grand Master the Earl of Mount Edgcumbe, and the rest of the Grand Officers Present and Past, coupling with the latter the names of Bros. Hamond le Strange and C. Cheston. The health of the Provincial Grand Master (Lord Henniker) and the Deputy Provincial Grand Master were received with the greatest cordiality, and the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, in returning thanks, touched briefly upon his pending removal from Suffolk, and which he said would be a great wrench to him after twenty-three years' residence at Long Melford. He reminded them that he was getting older, and could not cope with the work as he had formerly done. The Lord Chancellor had offered him a small living in Gloucestershire, and which he had accepted. The Provincial Grand Master, however, wished to retain him in the Province of Suffolk, but he did not believe in monopolising an office to the exclusion of others who could perform the duties more satisfactorily. He would lay his opinion before Lord Henniker, but if his lordship and the Masons of Suffolk considered that he should retain the office, it would be his dearest wish to do so. The other toasts were the Officers of Provincial Grand Lodge Past and Present, the Worshipful Masters of the Lodges in the Province, and the Visitors.

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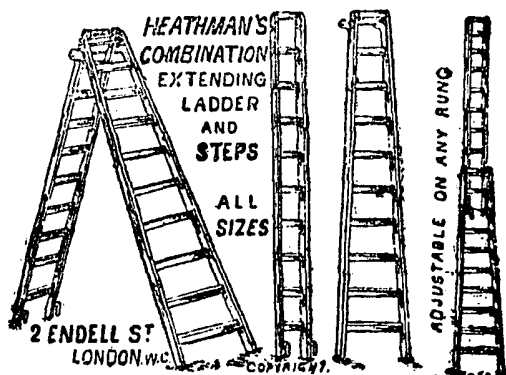
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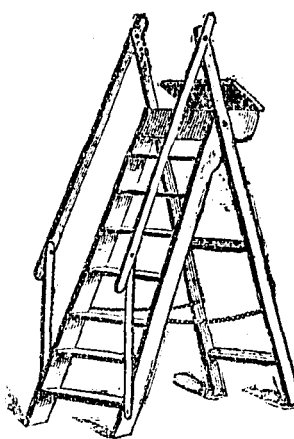
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
