ADMISSION OF LEWISES.

WE recently read in a contemporary a criticism on the custom of admitting gentlemen under we believe the writer was striving to make out his case by bringing ridicule on the practice, it may be inferred he had some foundation for saying the admission of youths into the Order was becoming so common, as to render it almost necessary for Woraddition to other credentials on the introduction of a candidate.

It is the almost universal custom in Freemasonry to limit the age of candidates to a minimum of twenty-one years, with the proviso that in case of emergency a dispensation may be granted for earlier admission; and we believe this rule is pretty generally acted up to in most rigorous fashion, the admission of Lewises being seldom permitted. But the question is a fair one for general discussion, inasmuch as many brethren are to be found who argue that members of Lodges should be allowed and even encouraged to introduce their sons before they reach the age of twenty-one years. We do not share that Freemasons regard twenty-one years as the minimum, influence it by clearing himself in the law courts. and require very strong evidence of emergency before an under-age candidate.

FREEMASONRY IN THE LAW COURTS.

IT speaks very much in favour of Freemasonry that, despite its large membership. despite its large membership, it seldom happens the age of twenty-one years as initiates; and although disputes arise in connection with its working which necessitate an appeal to the courts of law. We do occasionally see such a heading as the above in the papers, but more often than not an examination of the facts of the case prove that the dispute is not primarily a Masonic one, but rather some side issue shipful Masters to call for certificates of birth, in arising from Masonic association, or involving some part of the paraphernalia of Freemasonry.

Such a case occurred a few weeks back, when a parcel of Masonic jewellery was discovered in a public conveyance, and the owner objected to pay the usual poundage claimed by the Metropolitan Police. As a consequence the law was invoked to decide the point, but Freemasonry and the Law on that occasion had little or no association, although some of the papers headed their reports of the case as a "Masonic Dispute." Here is a case where Freemasonry is brought into disrepute on a manifestly side issue; one which, in reality, has no association with the Order itself, although the evidence of those defendants who urged that the canvasser stated he had been deputed by the Grand Lodge of Scotland to call on Freemasons, gives the subject a more than usual Masonic bearing, and would even seem to call for official inquiry, by the body concerned. We are sorry such a dispute should have arisen in connection with Bro. Gould's History, as the case has been very freely commented upon by Scottish papers, and opinions have doubtless been formed in many quarters by no means beneficial to Freemasonry, its members, or the book in question, and all the more damaging because they are based on error and the confusion of a work bearing a Masonic title with Masonry itself.

STAFFORDSHIRE.

THE annual assembly of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Staffordshire was held on the 7th inch Staffordshire was held on the 7th inst., under the presidency of Bro. Lieut.-Col. J. A. Bindley Past Provincial Grand Senior Warden, Deputy Provincial Grand Master, in whom the charge of the Province is now vested pending the appointment of a successor to the late lamented Provincial Grand Master, Colonel Foster Gough, at the Borough Hall, Stafford. The brethren of the Province mustered in strong numbers, about 220 being present. There are now 31 Lodges in Staffordshire, and nearly all

were represented.

The Deputy Provincial Grand Master and the Officers of Provincial Grand Lodge were saluted with the customary honours. The roll of Lodges having been called and the attendances noted, Grand Lodge was presented by the Provincial Grand Treasurer, Bro. Little Essex, as many of its members love to term the Province, takes all the credit to itself for having reformed the Boys' School, or at least that is so if we are to believe that the utterances of one of its Worshipful Masters represents the popular opinion of the district, and we see no reason why it should not. As the Worshipful Master of 2006 pointed out, it is something to be proud of to know that it was Essex Masons who called for the investigation into the management of the School, Essex Masons who saw it was properly done, and the Essex chief who presided at the first Festival after the reformation, when the handsome total of £23,000 was realised.

We are informed that early next year it is in contemplation to found a Lodge in connection with the Imperial Institute and that several distinguished Masonic officials have signified their approval of the scheme and willingness to join. It is proposed to request the M.W. Grand Master's acceptance of the post of Permanent Master, the Earl of Lathom that of S.W., and Lord Carrington that of J.W. Lord Herschell, who is taking great interest in the movement, will probably be the first Deputy Master in the chair. If the Lodge be held in one of the fine apartments of the Institute there would hardly be a more handsome Lodge room in the metropolis.

"The following are the names of those brethren who signed their names in the Tyler's book, whose handwriting was decipherable," is the way in which one of the leading daily papers of the country introduces the list of those present at a Provincial Grand Lodge meeting. This is hardly courteous or respectful to so distinguished a body as the attendants at a Provincial Grand Lodge, but we can well believe the sarcasm of the writer was fully justified. A long experience in such matters has convinced us that many Englishmen seem to regard it as out of place to take any care in writing their name; in fact, it almost seems as though the majority take infinite trouble to make their signatures as illigible as possible—and they often succeed in their efforts.

Responding to the toast of his health on the occasion of the installation banquet of his Lodge, the W.M. of No. 2169, meeting at East Cowes, Isle of Wight, expressed the hope that a new Lodge room would be erected during his term of office. We are always pleased to see such evidence of progress, and hope the desire of Bro. Brading will be carried to a successful issue.

Bro. the Earl of Jersey, late Governor and Commander-in-Chief of New South Wales, was on Monday, the 6th inst., presented by Sir Saul Samuel, Agent General for the Colony, with a beautifully illuminated address from the Corporation of Sydney. It expresses high appreciation of the statesmanlike manner in which his lordship had, during his occupancy of the office of representative of the Queen, presided over the destinies of that portion of Her Majesty's dominions, and spoke of how greatly Lord Jersey had endeared himself to the people of the Colony by his sympathy with the aims and aspirations and endeavours of that young country.

CHESHIRE.

PY command of the Grand Superintendent of Cheshire, Comp. the Rev. C. W. Spencer-Stanhope, M.A., the annual convocation of the Provincial Grand Chapter of Cheshire was held at the St. George's Schoolroom, Hyde, on Wednesday, the 8th inst.
