ROYALTY AND FREEMASONRY.

DURING the past week two of the most distinguished members of the English Royal Family have shown, by attendance and participation in the work of Freemasonry and its allied degrees, their personal interest in the cause we have at heart, and their desire to promote the interest and welfare of the Order.

The consecration of the Chancery Bar Lodge, on Tuesday, marked an epoch in Freemasonry which will long be remembered by those who were privileged to take part in the ceremonies of the day. H.R.H. the Prince of Wales Grand Master of the Craft attended the meeting, and took an active part in the work, a fact that is all the more noticeable because, although the Prince of Wales has been at the head of the Craft for many years past, this was the first Lodge consecration he had attended, and it is not to be wondered at, therefore, that the members of the Lodge he so honoured felt the compliment he paid them.

The previous Saturday H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught was installed as Provincial Grand Prior of Sussex in the Order of the Temple, and subsequently attended, as Provincial Grand Master in the Craft the regular meeting of the Earl of Sussex Lodge, when the Master for the year was installed and other business transacted.

These events, coming so closely together, would seem to imply a renewal of interest on the part of members of our Royal Family in the work of Freemasonry, and were we not fully alive to the fact that both the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Connaught continually interest themselves in the work of their respective offices in Freemasonry, but are prevented from making such public display of it as they both desire, we should feel inclined to accept their public appearance at so close an interval as indicative of something out of the common; but we are convinced that the joint re-appearance of the two leaders of these Craft after so long a period was merely a coincidence, brought about by the course of events, and delayed by the force of circumstances.

In another part of this issue we give details of the meeting at which the Grand Master took so prominent a part, and we shall next week refer more fully to the visit of the Duke of Connaught to Brighton. All we need do on the present occasion is to add our expressions of gratification to the many that have already been offered in connection with the two gatherings to which we refer, and express a hope that the future may witness many repetitions of such personal interest on the part of our Royal Family. We further hope that the other engagements of our Princes may not press so heavily upon them as to prevent their more frequent participation in the doings of Freemasonry in years to come, as compared with the past.

UNITED GRAND LODGE.

WE publish in another column the full agenda for the Quarterly Communication of Grand Lodge, to be held on Wednesday next. As usual at this season of the year the meeting will be particularly interesting from the fact that the business will include the nomination of a Grand Master for the ensuing year. This part of the business, however, may be dismissed in a word—the Prince of Wales will be renominated, and the popularity he enjoys is so well known that no other proposition will be thought of, much less seriously entertained or submitted to Grand Lodge.

Then will follow the nomination of Grand Treasurer for the ensuing year, and here we look for a little diversity of opinion, or, as it would perhaps be better to put it, enthusiasm on behalf of different brethren. It is generally understood there will be more than one nomination for this appointment, followed by a contested election at the following meeting of Grand Lodge, but the future must decide these points, as it is difficult as well as most unwise to prophesy on so delicate a question as the nomination and excitement of such a contest as is here involved. We like to see unanimity in such matters, but as has often been pointed out, there are many obstacles in the way of such a course, and as a consequence the Craft has occasionally to witness a display of friendly rivalry in connection with one of its most important offices. All we can hope for is that if a contest is necessary this year the brethren engaged in it will work towards each other with the same kindly feeling as has actuated the candidates of the past, who, it can truly be said, have never brought discredit on the system under which our Grand Treasurers are now selected.

The President of the Board of Benevolence will next be appointed and invested, and then the Senior and Junior Vice Presidents will be elected. As there is only one nomination for each office the election will be a mere matter of form, and Bros. James Brett and C. A. Cottebrune will be returned for the respective appointments. Twelve Past Masters will then have to be elected to serve on the Board during the ensuing year, and for these twelve appointments there are fifteen nominations. A ballot may therefore be expected under this head.

The Report of the Board of Benevolence for the quarter contains recommendations for three grants of £50 each, and one of £75, and there is also a resolution of this Board to deal with, in the form of a vote of thanks to the President, Bro. Robert Grey, for his courtesy during the past year, while presiding over the meetings of the Board.

The Report of the Board of General Purposes brings forward a most unusual and happily uncommon item, it being proposed to suspend a Brother for contumacy, under the powers of Rule 274 of the Constitutions. We are sure that the justice of the case will be tempered

with that mercy that always characterises Freemasons. The absence of returns from several Lodges will also be dealt with.

Grand Lodge will next be asked to give its consent to a revised scale of remuneration for its officials. The details of the proposed increases are given elsewhere, but we imagine there are very few members of Grand Lodge who will devote much attention to their consideration, as it strikes us the justice of the revision proposed by the Sub-Committee who have considered the question will be at once admitted, and the increases readily agreed to. As the Prince of Wales stated, at the Consecration of the Chancery Bar Lodge on Tuesday, he has issued 1,027 Warrants for new Lodges during the period he has been at the head of the Craft. This has not been a spasmodic increase, but an almost universal one, and it gives the very best evidence that can be adduced of the growth in the work that must have taken place at the headquarters of English Freemasonry. The last revision of salaries in the office of the Grand Secretary took place in 1874, the year of the Prince of Wales's accession to the Grand Mastership, so that the comments of the Grand Master in regard to the growth of the Order are particularly worthy of consideration in connection with this question, as giving the very best of evidence as to the increased work in the office. But, as we have said, we feel there is no necessity to dilate on this subject—we expect the proposed increases will be agreed to without a dissentient voice, and should be very sorry to imagine it possible for any section of the Order to oppose a course of action which can certainly be recommended with justice and fairness to all concerned. No one can complain of the way in which this work of Freemasonry is carried out, and being so no one will object to paying a fair price for it.

The Library and Museum of Grand Lodge has received several additions during the last quarter, all of which are set out in the Report under notice. We are pleased to see this feature still remains in favour, and hope the outcome will be a collection worthy the position and standing of our Grand Lodge.

Six new Warrants have been issued during the quarter, all for Lodges to meet at home, two in London and four in the Provinces, the last here recorded bearing the number 2492.

With this brief summary we dismiss the matter, and look forward to a pleasant and interesting gathering of the leaders of the Craft.

NEXT YEAR'S FESTIVALS.

WE are pleased to know that the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution has enlisted the services of Col. Noel Money Provincial Grand Master Surrey, as President for its Festival of next year, and further that the Pro Grand Master of England, Lord Lathom, has consented to fulfil a similar duty on behalf of the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls. We shall again refer to these matters in an early issue.

CONSECRATION OF THE CHANCERY-BAR LODGE.

ON Tuesday night this Lodge was consecrated in the Library of Lincoln's Inn by the Earl of Lathom, Pro Grand Master, in the presence of the Prince of Wales Most Worshipful Grand Master, the Earl of Mount Edgcumbe Deputy Grand Master, and more than 250 other brethren of the Order. The Lodge is numbered 2,456, but this does not represent the actual number of Lodges under the English Constitution, as, since the last "closing up" of the list, now forty years ago, a few Lodges have died out, some have been erased, and some three hundred others in

the colonies have, with Lodges under the Irish or Scotch Constitutions, formed Grand Lodges of their own. But there are still 2,100 Lodges on the English roll, and some of these of late years have been established for the convenience of men of particular callings. In this way several volunteer corps have their own Lodges, the medical profession have more than one, chemists have another, the press have another, Scotchmen in London have one to themselves, while in many other cases classes are specially provided, an arrangement that has often been commented upon in our pages. The members in the Chancery Bar, however, were without one of their own, while practitioners in the Queen's Bench Division had had the Northern Bar Lodge for many years. According to the prayer of a petition presented to the Grand Master about a year ago by twenty-six members of the Chancery Bar, the Prince of Wales granted a warrant for a Lodge with the name of the Chancery Bar to meet at Lincoln's Inn Hall, the benchers of the Inn having allowed the hall as the locus for the new Lodge. Lincoln's Inn is therefore the only Inn of Court with a Masonic Lodge attached to it. The ceremony of consecration was fixed by the Prince of Wales for 28th November, and at six o'clock that evening the brethren assembled. There were to be found among them the following distinguished members:—the Lord Chancellor, Lord Halsbury, Lord Ashbourne, Justice Romer, Justice Bruce, Justice Kennedy, the Earl of Jersey, Lord Suffield, Lord George Hamilton, M.P., the Earl of Euston, Lord Brooke, Akers-Douglas, M.P., W. W. B. Beach, M.P., Col. Townley Caldwell, Sir John Monckton, Col. Noel Money, Col. Le G. N. Starkie, Alderman and Sheriff Dimsdale, Canon Bullock, Sir Albert Woods (Garter), Sir G. D. Harris, Sir Douglas Straight, Sir Forrest Fulton, Major-Gen. J. C. Hay, Col. Tatham, Sir J. Savory, M.P., Ald. Sir Henry Knight, Sir W. Marriott, Col. Harding, and a very large number of Queen's Counsel.

Before the Prince of Wales entered Bro. E. Letchworth, the Grand Secretary, formally opened the Lodge, the Senior Warden's chair being occupied by Bro. Thomas Fenn, while Bro. Robert Grey took that of Junior Warden, with Bro. J. H. Matthews as Inner Guard. The Prince of Wales almost immediately afterwards came in, all the brethren standing while the National Anthem was being played by Bro. Sergison, grand organist. His Royal Highness took the Master's chair, and had the Earl of Lathom on his left as Past Grand Master, and the Earl of Mount-Edgcumbe on his right as Deputy Grand Master. Lord Halsbury assumed the chair of Senior Warden at His Royal Highness's command, while Akers-Douglas, M.P., the Junior Grand Warden of the year, took the chair of J.W.; Canon Bullock, and the Reverend N. A. Macdonald acting as Chaplains, Sir Albert Woods acting as Director of Ceremonies, and Bro. Samuel Pope, Q.C., as Inner Guard. After the usual formula had been observed, the Earl of Lathom announced that the Prince of Wales had requested him to perform the ceremony.

Canon Bullock delivered an oration upon Freemasonry as it existed in the present day. He remarked that nearly 100 years ago, at a very large assembly of Masons in 1793, the Prince of Wales presented to the reigning Sovereign a petition in which the Masonic body were described as "unknown to the law." They might with deep gratitude in 1893 be at any rate sure of this—that henceforth the Masonic body, if unknown to the law, could not be unknown to the lawyers. They would have henceforth brought into their Craft learning which they certainly stood in need of, and they might hope in the future to glean information and learn many lessons from the newly-founded and constituted Chancery Bar Lodge. At the present time it was absolutely necessary constantly to enforce this great principle, that quality rather than quantity ought to constitute their Order; that it was of almost vital importance that they should, so far as they could, be sure of the character—of the quality, if he might use the expression—of those admitted into their Order.

The ceremony of consecration followed, the Earl of Lathom performing his office admirably, being ably assisted by the Chaplains, while the choir, under Brother Sergison, rendered some superb vocal music. The ceremony over, the Prince of Wales personally "constituted" the Lodge, every word of the form he used being distinctly heard throughout the large hall. The Master of the Lodge for the first year is Bro. B. W. Coltman, a Past Master of many years standing, and that brother was obligated and installed by the Grand Secretary. Brother Coltman afterwards invested the following brethren

as his Officers for the year:—R. Horton Smith, Q.C. (P.M. P.P.G. Reg. Cambs. and Middx.) Senior Warden, S. Hall, Q.C. Junior Warden, G. Pemberton Leach Treasurer, L. G. Gordon Robbins (Senior Grand Deacon) Secretary, Rev. H. R. Cooper Smith, D.D. (Past Grand Chaplain) Chaplain, W. E. M. Tomlinson, M.P. (P.P.G.W. West Lancashire) Senior Deacon, E. Beaumont (P.G. Stwd.) Junior Deacon, E. Swinfen Eady, Q.C., Inner Guard, W. G. Lemon (P. Asst. G.D.C.) Director of Ceremonies, J. Bradley Dyne Steward, E. Cutler, Q.C. (Past Grand Organist) Organist. Brother Coltman before closing the Lodge, personally thanked the Prince of Wales for honouring the Chancery Bar with his presence, and announced to the brethren that his Royal Highness had graciously given permission for him to make the following proposition: "That his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, Most Worshipful Grand Master, be invited by acclamation to honour the Chancery Bar Lodge by allowing himself to be named as its first honorary member." The motion was seconded by the Senior Warden and unanimously carried. After some formalities the Lodge was closed, and the party adjourned to a banquet in Lincoln's Inn Hall.

After dinner the usual toasts were proposed.

The Worshipful Master, in proposing the health of the Most Worshipful Grand Master the Prince of Wales, said it was a toast which was always popular in Masonic Lodges, but in the Chancery Bar Lodge it ought to be more particularly popular, because it was now more than 32 years ago that his Royal Highness had allowed his name to be enrolled among the Benchers of the Middle Temple, thus showing at that period of his life the high estimate he entertained of the members of the Bar. He might say that as members of the Chancery Bar Lodge they were all proud of the Grand Master, because they believed he had the feelings of a thorough Englishman, and because of his great admiration for the grand institutions of the country.

The Prince of Wales in reply, said—Brethren, I am most grateful for the very kind and flattering terms in which the W.M. of the Chancery Bar Lodge has proposed this toast, and of the high position I am so proud to hold as the Grand Master of the Freemasons of England. It has not been my good fortune to meet the Masonic brethren for some time, but various circumstances and the duties which I have to perform do not enable me to meet them as often as I could wish. They will, I am sure, feel on this occasion I am particularly proud and happy to meet them. I have to-night taken part in a most interesting ceremony—namely, the consecration of this new Lodge. As has been alluded to by the Worshipful Master, my connection with the Bar is of old date. Many years I have been a Bencher of the Middle Temple, and although an older Bencher than I am a Mason, I am glad to think that on this occasion the grand legal profession and the Masonic brethren are more intimately connected to-night than perhaps they have been before. Since my installation as your Grand Master, now nearly nineteen years ago, I have granted warrants for new Lodges amounting to 1,027. None have been more prosperous or successful than the Northern Bar Lodge. You have had as members of it some most distinguished and leading members of the Bar. The new Lodge which we have consecrated and established to-day has been founded on the same lines, and I most sincerely hope that it may be as successful and prosperous as the brother Lodge. I can only thank you once more for the way you have received me, and be assured that I always take the deepest interest in everything that concerns Freemasonry. I hope, especially as an Englishman, that Masons will continue to flourish in the way they have done hitherto.

The Worshipful Master next proposed the toast of the Consecrating Officers, with which he coupled the name of the Earl of Lathom. He took the opportunity of thanking Sir Albert Woods and the Grand Secretary for what they had done to assist in making the ceremonies of the evening successful, previously to the performance of these ceremonies.

The Earl of Lathom responded, and proposed the health of the Chancery Bar Lodge, long life to it, coupled with the name of the Worshipful Master. He also made special reference to the Northern Bar Lodge, and said that they all admired the Bar, but they admired it even more now when they found it rally round Freemasonry. What we wanted more in this country was that intelligent and well-educated men should take an interest in Freemasonry. The more of such men that took an interest in it, the more it would flourish.

The Worshipful Master, having responded, proposed the Bench and the Bar.

The Lord Chancellor replied for the Bench, and Bro. S. Pope, Q.C., for the Bar, both of them being members of the Northern Bar Lodge.

The Prince of Wales proposed the Visitors, a toast which had been omitted from the toast list. He said: The Worshipful Master has allowed me to propose one more toast, that is not set down on our list to-night. On the present evening a great many distinguished visitors, members of the Craft, are present, and it would not do for us to separate without their names being toasted. I have great pleasure in proposing it, and coupling with it the name of a distinguished lawyer, a distinguished member of Parliament, a distinguished Mason, and also one who with the facility of the pencil has great facility of speech; forgive me saying that, while I assure you of the pleasure it gives me to ask Brother Lockwood to respond to the toast of the Visitors.

Brother Lockwood made a humorous reply, in which he expressed himself as amused at being counted as a visitor in Lincoln's Inn, of which he was a member.

The party, immediately after the Tyler's toast was given, which was nearly 11 o'clock, separated.

CONSECRATION: WHITE ROSE OF YORK LODGE, No. 2491.

AN important addition to the Lodges of West Yorkshire was made on Monday by the consecration, at Sheffield, of this Lodge. The ceremony was impressively performed by the Right Hon. W. L. Jackson, M.P., Provincial Grand Master, who was accompanied by many Present and Past Officers of the Provincial Grand Lodge, and representatives from all parts of West Yorkshire and adjoining Provinces. Bro. Richard Wilson occupied the Senior Warden's and Bro. Ensor Drury the Junior Warden's chair, and the other brethren taking prominent parts in the proceedings were the Rev. J. Dunbar P.G.C., W. D. Hollis P.G.D.C., J. Matthewman P.G. Assistant Secretary, W. J. Waugh P.G.R., J. E. Darling P.P.G. Sword Bearer, J. Constable and Wm. Haigh P.G. Standard Bearers. Thos. W. Hanforth, Mus. Bac., officiated at the organ, and the incidental music was beautifully rendered by Bros. Geo. May, Lawrence Fryer, and Robert de Lacy, from St. Paul's Cathedral, and Bro. Harry Stubbs, from St. George's Chapel Royal, Windsor.

In the course of the Consecration the Provincial Grand Chaplain delivered an admirable address, dwelling on the common meeting ground offered in Masonry to men who, whatever their worldly station, were all subjects of one Great Creator and objects of His paternal love, and urging the brethren always to act up to the tenets of the Craft, and to have an ear to listen, a heart to sympathise, and a hand to help.

The Provincial Grand Master also addressed the brethren at this stage in the proceedings. He observed that it was to Sheffield he paid his first visit to any Lodge in his capacity as Provincial Grand Master; it was in connection with the application for the granting of a Charter for the White Rose of York Lodge that he performed his first official act as Provincial Grand Master; and that occasion being his first experience of consecrating a Lodge, would make him always remember Sheffield with affection and gratitude. The White Rose was closely connected with the County of York if one might believe enthusiastic cricketers and football players who called their clubs after it, but he was told that students who had looked into the matter took leave to differ from that view. However that might be, he was glad that such a beautiful name had been found for that youngest child of theirs. The Lodge was No. 2,491 on the roll of the Grand Lodge of England. The last new Lodge consecrated in the Province of West Yorkshire was the Lodge of St. Lawrence (No. 2,360), and was consecrated four years ago by his predecessor, their dear Bro. T. W. Tew. From that they could easily estimate how great had been the progress of the Order to which they were so proud to belong. In four years there had been added to the number of Lodges owning the sway of Grand Lodge an average of nearly 40 Lodges per year. It was a matter of great congratulation that Masonry was spreading at such a rate, if they were careful that none but worthy men were admitted to its privileges. There was a great responsibility resting upon men who took part in founding

a new Lodge, but he felt that in Bro. Hunt, whom they had selected as first Worshipful Master, they had the best of all guarantees that nothing would be left undone to preserve its reputation inviolate and pure. He himself had every confidence that everything would be done by the members of the Lodge to carry out the principles of the Order, and as the flower that had been taken as an emblem of the Lodge had certain characteristics he relied upon its members to see that they were also characteristic of the Lodge. He trusted that by the exercise of charity and mercy the Lodge would illustrate the beauty of the flower, that brotherly love and affection within its walls might exemplify the fragrance, and that its future reputation might remain, like the White Rose, spotless for ever.

The Worshipful Master designate, Bro. John Hunt P.M. P.P.G.D., was then installed with due formalities by Bro. W. H. Brittain P.M. P.G. Sword Bearer (England) P.P.G.W. The W.M. invested his Officers, as follow:—Bros. T. H. Vernon P.M. S.W., C. F. Brindley J.W., Joseph Craven Treasurer, William Gadsby P.M. P.P.G.O. Secretary, William Gunstone S.D., Carl A. Hahn J.D., Geo. Wise D.O., William Middleton I.G., A. N. Tucker and John Stokes Stewards, T. W. Hanforth, Mus. Bac., Organist, and T. Leighton Tyler. The remaining founders were Bro. J. L. Potts, J. Jackman, J. Eadon, J. Shaw P.M. P.P.G.S. of W., J. Bromley P.M., Thomas Collinson P.M. P.P.G.D. of C., and George B. Owen W.M., with Bro. H. J. Garnett P.M. P.P.G.S.B., and Andrew Macredie P.M. P.G.D. as Hon. Past Masters.

The Lodge having been closed in due form, a sumptuous banquet, to which nearly a hundred brethren sat down, was admirably served by Bro. Turner. The newly-installed W.M. presided, having on his right the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Bro. H. Smith, in the absence of the Provincial Grand Master, who had been compelled to leave owing to an engagement in London. A lengthy toast list was gone through, interspersed with songs and glees magnificently rendered by the musical brethren from London, together with pianoforte solos by Bro. T. W. Hanforth, Mus. Bac., who also officiated as accompanist. The usual toasts were drunk, and a very pleasant evening was spent.

PRESENTATION TO REV. DR. LEMON.

LODGE Sincerity's refectory at Stonehouse Town Hall was crowded on the 13th ultimo, the company including upwards of fifty Past Masters, representing the chief Lodges of the Three Towns, the occasion being the celebration of the Masonic coming of age of the Rev. Dr. T. W. Lemon, one of the oldest Past Masters of Sincerity, well-known for his readiness to assist in Masonic working, and an ardent supporter of the Charities of the Order.

After the work in the Lodge, which consisted of the raising of Bro. F. E. Peach, and some matters of routine business, the party sat down to refreshment.

The loyal toasts having been honoured, Bro. Frank E. Sach S.W. proposed the health of the W.M., whom he said the brethren admired for the excellent and able manner in which he had worked the Lodge that evening. He was an old Mason, and highly esteemed by the brethren of the Lodge.

Bro. George Dunsterville suitably replied, observing that he had the interests of the Lodge at heart.

Bro. George Hawken P.M. and Treasurer then submitted the health of Bro. Dr. Lemon, which was most cordially received. The large attendance of brethren representing the various Lodges in the Three Towns was to show their respect, esteem, and love to a brother whose twenty-first birthday in Freemasonry they were celebrating. Although Bro. Lemon was initiated under the banner of Lodge Sincerity, the ceremony took place in Lodge Metham, who kindly placed their rooms at their disposal whilst their own were undergoing alteration. There was no Mason in the district who had done more for Freemasonry than Bro. Lemon, and the annals of the Order would bear testimony to his good work, especially in respect to the Charities, of each of which he was a Vice-Patron. He asked them to drink long life and happiness to Bro. Lemon. The toast was drunk with musical honours.

The Rev. Dr. Lemon, in reply, said that to say he had been a member of the Lodge for twenty-one years was something to be proud of. He was the oldest Past Master of the Lodge, with the exception of the Earl of Mount Edgcumbe and Bro. T. W. Coffin. The latter was W.M. of the Lodge when he was initiated, and he had received flattering letters from him and Bro. G. A. Rae, who was the Secretary at the time. He trusted that what he had been able to do had been of some benefit to the Order, and that he would be spared to still further work for Masonry.

Bro. John Parker J.W. gave the P.M.s, and Bro. Frank R. Thomas, in response, testified to the zeal and ability of Dr. Lemon, who was held in high esteem by the Fraternity, and whose gifts to the various

Masonic Lodges were much appreciated. He congratulated Brother George Dunsterville, who was an older Mason than Bro. Lemon, on having at length reached the chair. Through his position in life—having travelled extensively—he had not been able to occupy that position before, and he had proved that he was a W.M. of whom they might be proud.

Bro. A. S. Hendry P.M. and Secretary P.G.S.D., in giving the Visitors, said they were always welcome to Lodge Sincerity.

Bro. J. R. Lord, in response, said Bro. Lemon had distinguished himself in Freemasonry, and Freemasonry had recognised his services by distinguishing him. Bro. Lemon held high honours in Freemasonry, which he thought he appreciated. He appealed to them to subscribe to the Devon Education Fund, which now educated twenty children at a cost of £15 each per year, and which fund was maintained by voluntary subscriptions. Lodge Sincerity had a W.M. of whom they might well be proud. Bro. Lemon was wedded to Freemasonry, and they hoped to soon celebrate the silver wedding.

Bro. W. Allsford, who also replied, spoke in eulogistic terms of Bro. Lemon's services to Masonry. Other toasts followed.

Bros. Bird, Goulding, Clark, and R. A. Roberts contributed to the musical programme.—*Western Morning News*.

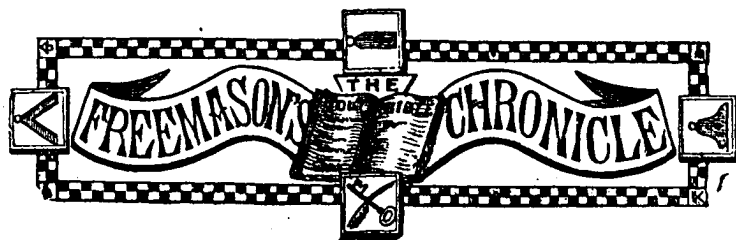

And a resolution of a vote of thanks to the President, V.W. Robert Grey, for the courteous manner in which he has, during the past year, presided over the meetings of the Board.

9. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

To the United Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of England.

A complaint having been made in June last by the Stuart Lodge, No. 1632, Camberwell, against a late Treasurer, for neglecting to hand to his successor a balance of £53 14s 5d, the property of the Lodge, which had been received by him in his official capacity, the Brother was summoned to attend the Board to answer the charge, but pleaded illness. He was then summoned to attend the next meeting, and again failing to appear, a peremptory summons was issued, with which he also failed to comply or to give a sufficient reason for non-compliance. It was therefore resolved:—"That the Brother be suspended from all Masonic functions and privileges for contumacy under the powers of Rule 274 of the Book of Constitutions."

The Board beg to report that the following Lodges have failed to make returns for many years, notwithstanding repeated applications :—

Lodge St. Cybi, No. 597, Holyhead, has also failed to make returns since 1889, no notice having been taken of several applications.

The Board recommend that these Lodges be summoned to show cause why they should not be erased.

The Warrant granted to a Lodge to be called the Reunion Lodge, Blenheim, New Zealand, No. 2445, has been returned, arrangements having been made which rendered its use unnecessary. The Warrant being therefore extinct, the Board recommend that the Lodge be erased from the list.

The Board reported to Grand Lodge in June last that a Sub-Committee had been appointed in the previous year to inquire into the working of the Grand Secretary's office, and arising out of this Report certain recommendations of the Board were then adopted. The labours of the Sub-Committee have now been completed, and

their final Report, as follows, has been made to and adopted by the Board :—

"We have considered the remuneration of the various members of the staff and officials, and are of opinion that a revision should take place. We submit a new scale for the consideration of the Board.

The last revision took place in the year 1874, and at the Quarterly Communication in June of that year the salaries of officials of Grand Lodge were fixed at the following scale :—

Taking these facts into consideration, of the increase in the number of Lodges, of certificates issued, and of the annual increase in the receipts during the last twenty years, we are of opinion that the time has arrived for revising the salaries in the Grand Secretary's office.

In making such revisions, however, we consider that the recommendations for increase should apply in each case to the present holder of the office only in consideration of his length of service, and that the scale settled in 1874 should still remain in force with respect to all new appointments.

Since the year 1874 the work in the Grand Secretary's office has increased so much that it has been found necessary to engage the services of three additional clerks.

The Grand Secretary was also authorised by resolution of the Board of the 28th April 1893 to engage the services of a clerk to take down letters and other matters in shorthand, and this he has done, but the clerk so appointed is only yet on probation.

In addition to the office of Grand Tyler Bro. Sadler performs the duties of Sub-Librarian, for which he receives a salary of £20 per annum. Bro. Sadler has many qualifications for this office and a considerable amount of Masonic knowledge and information. It appears that in order to keep the Library in the efficient state in which it is, he devotes nearly the whole of his leisure time to the work. We consider the salary of £20 per annum quite inadequate, and think that his salary as Assistant Librarian should be raised to £40.

There are three Porters in the establishment earning weekly wages, and we think they should all be increased to a maximum as under :—

We may mention that all the different numbers are printed in neat and attractive style.

"How to Accompany," a guide to the artistic accompaniment of any musical composition, from the simplest ballad to the most difficult of modern works, by Annie Glen, will prove most useful, while No. 6 of Messrs. Cooks' "Modern Methods," being Charles Webb's "Tonic Solfa Method," songs, &c. No. 4. (In dem Garten) of "Six Volkslieder," by Maude Valerie White, are both well worth attention.

The following songs are good compositions:—"The Land of yesterday," words by Clifton Bingham, music by Angelo Mascheroni, and dedicated to and sung by Miss Lily Moody; "Concord," words by "R. B.," music by Edwin D. Lloyds; "Si j'étais Dieu," words by Sully Prudhomme, music by Maude Valerie White; "Douleurs Divines," words by Emilie Angier, English version by Eugène Oudin, music by Maude Valerie White, and is sung by Mr. Oudin; "Nita, Gitani," words by F. E. Weatherley, music by Ernest Newton; "Unforgotten," words by François Coppé, English version by Harold Boulton, and music by Tivadar Nachez; "Abschied" (Fare thee well) with German and English words, written and composed by Eduard Zeldeneust; "The Mousmee"; or, "His Sweetheart in Japan," words by Douglas Sladen, music by Walter Hedgcock.
