But it is not merely as a matter of form that we to-day tender brief words of greeting to our readers; we are sincere in wishing them a prosperous New Year, and we hope we shall be called upon on many similar occasions to perform a like mission. Looking back it seems a very long period since we took a part in the preparation of the first issue of this paper, and very great changes have taken place since then, but we have the satisfaction of numbering among our present subscribers several who commenced their support at that time, and have continued it ever since, so that we feel confident, when we say that we shall endeavour to conduct the paper on similar lines in the future as have governed it in the past, that we shall satisfy our older readers, and, we hope, win a large number of new ones, all of whom we shall endeavour to keep fully posted in the working of the Craft.

MASONIC CHARITY IN THE PAST YEAR.

THE year just closed has been one of continued success for the three central Institutions of English Freemasonry, although the amount received is somewhat short of the previous year, the totals being £65,012 7s 8d and £62,654 13s 11d for 1894 and 1895 respectively. The difference, however, is more than covered under one heading—that of Perpetual and Life Presentations, which are absent from the returns of 1895, while they figured for £3,045 in those of the previous year.

As will be seen from the totals we give below the Benevolent Institution has alone exceeded its total of 1894, the increase last year being close upon £1,000, while the Boys and the Girls have each fallen off, the former about £1,500, and the latter £1,800. This is to be accounted for in the case of the Boys when we remember the special efforts made on behalf of that Institution in 1894, but in the case of the Girls School it must be set down as a natural fluctuation, rather than evidence of any lack of interest in its welfare on the part of the members of the Craft.

THE PAST YEAR IN THE WEST.

THE Craft in Devon and Cornwall, and so in the adjoining counties, has been most active during the past year, and on the whole it has proved a most prosperous time, both in what is termed Craft Masonry and the higher degrees. The charities have been well supported for local purposes, and fairly well for the central Institutions, but it is undeniable that the educational funds as raised, managed, and distributed by each separate Province, as in Devon, Cornwall, and Dorset, are increasing in popularity year by year, not only because of their local arrangement, but the costs are practically nil, and the benefits widely distributed through the neighbourhoods from which the subscriptions are obtained. By these means about twenty-five children are being educated and partly maintained in the three counties named, and many are also assisted subsequently for their advancement in life.

The first festival of the year was for the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution, and was held under the chairmanship of Lord Dungarvan Prov. G.M. of Somerset, by which the sum of £14,000 was raised. Dorset sent up 100 guineas, and Somerset obtained £246 15s. The second was for the Girls, when the very popular Deputy Grand Master the Earl of Mount-Edgumbe presided. His lordship's Province sent up over £700, over one-half being obtained by Bro. E. D. Anderton Prov. G. Secretary of Cornwall, who was one of the Stewards, the others also doing admirably. Somerset forwarded £37 16s. The total for all England was over £16,000. The final festival was for the Boys. Bro. J. Taylor, J.P. (Torquay), as Steward, secured some £150, and Bro. F. B. Westlake (Plymouth) over £50. Dorset was represented by £210 and Somerset by £50. The large amount of £19,000 was raised.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of Barnstaple, presided over by Lord Ebrington Prov. G.M. was a successful meeting. After many years of valuable service Bro. W. D. Rogers has retired from the office of Deputy Prov. G.M., Bro. Major G. C. Davie P.A.G.D.C. of England being appointed to succeed him, and Bro. John Brewer has again become Prov. Grand Secretary. Newton Abbot had the honour of receiving the Mark Provincial Grand Lodge, which was presided over by the Hon. Sir Stafford Northcote, Bart., C.B. (the Prov. G.M.), Captain G. S. Strode-Lowe, of Plymouth, being again the D. Prov. G.M., and Brother Henry Stocker (of Exeter) the Prov. G. Sec. The Prov. Grand R.A. Chapter was held at Exeter, but the degree is not so prosperous just now as it used to be, in proportion to the increase of membership generally. Knight Templary in Devon has taken a new lease under the genial rule of Major G. C. Davie, J.P., who has just been installed as the new Prov. Prior, in succession to the Rev. Dr. Lemon, who resigned that office.

The fraternity in Cornwall has been busy through 1895. The Prov. G. Lodge was convened at Saltash for the first time, and was a great success. The Earl of Mount-Edgumbe presided, and was once more supported by the veteran Craftsman Sir Charles B. G. Sawle P.G.W. of England the D. Prov. G.M. Brother E. D. Anderton again consented to act as Prov. G. Sec. The Earl of Mount-Edgumbe was earlier in the year at

Liskeard to lay the foundation-stone of the Cottage Hospital, with full Masonic honours. The donor, Brother Passmore Edwards, also took part, ably supported by the Mayor, Bro. W. H. Stanton, and other dignitaries. Later on the jubilee of the Lodge at Liskeard was celebrated, fifty years having passed since its inauguration in August 1845. The members wisely determined to free their handsome Masonic Hall from debt as the best form of commemoration, so on the day fixed the deeds were duly presented to the W.M. free from all encumbrance. They likewise presented a handsome gold watch and an illuminated testimonial to Bro. R. A. Courtney Prov. S.G.W. of Cornwall, so long the indefatigable Secretary of the Lodge. An address on the history of the Craft for the last fifty years was read from Brother W. J. Hughan P.S.G.D. of England, thus completing a most enjoyable gathering. Mark Masonry is still as prosperous as ever, with Bro. Sir Charles Sawle as Prov. G.M. and Bro. W. J. Johns as Prov. Grand Secretary. The Cornish Lodge, London, is well supported by Cornish Brethren, and Cornishmen, the present W.M. being Bro. John Leach Barrett (some time since a resident of Truro), Dr. Curnow is the S.W., and the Rev. Canon Shuttleworth the J. W.

Bro. J. B. Gover P.M. and Secretary of the Lodge St. John, No. 70, Plymouth, in recognition of his great services for over forty years, was presented by the members with his portrait, and Mrs. Gover with a tea and coffee service—honours well deserved.

The Earl of Mount-Edgumbe presided at the annual Festival of the Grand Lodge of England in April (as Deputy Grand Master, in the unavoidable absence of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales), about 600 being present. Brother John Lane, in recognition of his invaluable work, "Masonic Records, 1717-1894," was appointed to the rank of P.A.G.D.C. by his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, G.M., and as P.A.G.D.C. in the Grand Chapter. Bro. William Lake P.M. 131, Truro, so long a resident of that city, but during recent years editor of the "Freemason," London, was invested as Assistant Grand Secretary, and is now chief clerk in the office of the Grand Secretary. These compliments are much appreciated by the local Craft.—"Western Morning News."

Field-Marshal Lord Roberts Senior Grand Warden of England, and one of the founders of the National Artillery Lodge, No. 2578, which is to be consecrated at the Criterion, on the 15th inst., will act for the first twelve months as Immediate Past Master to Lieutenant-Colonel J. T. Ritchie, R.A., the first Master of the Lodge.

On New Year's eve, at the Victoria Hall, Weston-super-Mare, the members of the St. Kew Lodge gave their annual treat to the aged poor of the town, when upwards of 350 accepted the invitation and thoroughly enjoyed Masonic hospitalities. A "high tea" having been partaken of, with selections by the Grosvenor Quintet Band at intervals, a miscellaneous programme was gone through, including a minstrel entertainment.

THE annual Convocation of the Provincial Grand Chapter was held at the Masonic Hall, Cheltenham, on Friday, 20th ult. The Right Hon. Sir Michael E. Hicks-Beach, Bart., Grand Superintendent of the Province presided, supported by Comp. R. V. Vassar-Smith P.Z. 82 and 839 Prov.G.H., and others.

Sir Michael, in reply, feelingly acknowledged the cordiality of his reception. The cares to which the Baron had referred added to the pleasure with which he found himself once more surrounded by his Brethren. Remembering the many happy hours he had spent amongst them, it would indeed be strange if he did not keep a warm corner in his heart for his old county and the Masons of Gloucestershire.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach was the guest of Comp. Vassar-Smith for the night, at Charlton Park.

The members of the Woodgrange Lodge, No. 2409, announce that the second annual Masonic ball in connection with their successful Lodge will be held at the Stratford Town Hall, on Wednesday, 5th February, in aid of the funds of the West Ham Hospital, Brethren of other Lodges and non-Masons being invited. On Friday, 27th ult., under the auspices of the Royal St. Edmunds and the Abbey Lodges, a grand ball was held in the Athenæum Hall, Bury St. Edmunds. The ball was under the distinguished patronage of the Marquis and Marchioness of Bristol, Lord Henniker Provincial Grand Master Suffolk, the Earl of Euston Provincial Grand Master Norths and Hunts, Viscount Chelsea, M.P. for Bury St. Edmunds, Ian Malcolm, M.P. for the North-Western (Stowmarket) Division of Suffolk, Rev. C. J. Martyn Deputy Provincial Grand Master (formerly rector of Long Melford), John G. Oliver P.M. P.P.G.S.W. Mayor of Bury St. Edmunds, the Mayoress, and other distinguished ladies and gentlemen and members of the Craft. The Brethren appeared in Masonic costume, and military officers in uniform. The scene was remarkably picturesque as dancing proceeded, many of the dresses of the ladies being much admired.

The Stockton Freemasons' Hall and Club Co., Limited, has been formed to acquire the buildings known as the Stockton Freemasons' Hall, with its furnishings, &c.; to take over the Freemasons' Club, its fittings, &c., and to let the buildings and devote the profits to the company. The building originally cost, with furnishing, £7,500 odd, and belongs to the Lodge of Philanthropy, who have agreed to transfer the property to the company for £5,100, of which £100 will be taken in shares. The capital of the company is £5,000 in £1 shares. The company is confined to Freemasons, and a great many shares have been subscribed. Eight of the leading Masons of Stockton are the directors, with, as a ninth, and who is chairman of the company, Brother W. J. Watson P.M. P.P.J.G.D., the Town Clerk of Thornaby-on-Tees, Messrs. Backhouse and Co. are the bankers, Messrs. Wilson, Ornsby, and Cadle the solicitors, and Bro. R. Tinkler, Rosebank, Stockton, the secretary.

The Cardinal Vicar has addressed the following letter to the Central Executive Committee in Italy for the first Anti-Masonic Congress:— "The Anti-Masonic Congress which will be held next year is looked forward to by all religious persons. It is unnecessary to demonstrate the errors of Freemasonry or to regret the havoc wrought by it, to you who are so perfectly acquainted with its theoretic and practical character. Nor is there any need to insist upon the fact that the Catholic Church and civilised society are confronted with no more powerful obstacle than Freemasonry, which is the enemy of all their endeavours to procure the temporal and eternal welfare of the nations. Notwithstanding this, nay, in consequence of it, I encourage you to work in the Congress, carrying beyond the Alps, in the name of Rome and of Italy, the treasures of your learning, experience, and virtue. Such enemies can only be overcome by the power of God, Who, in making men the instruments of His designs, would have them atone with faith and charity." The letter is given: "From the Vicariate on the solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, 1895." —"Tablet."

WELL DESERVED PRAISE.

A BAZAAR, under the auspices of the Isle of Axholme Lodge, No. 1482, the Worshipful Master of which is Brother H. L. Burtonshaw, was successfully held on Wednesday, 18th ult., in the Crowle Market Hall.

In the afternoon, several Brethren (including Provincial Officers) supported Bro. Sissons the D.P.G. Master of Lincolnshire, who opened the bazaar with an address, in the course of which he said: No Lodge of its size, and very few larger Lodges, have made such a record of charitable work as yours; you have ever taken a deep interest in the various charitable institutions connected with our ancient Order of Freemasonry, and identified yourselves most earnestly with that noble work of love and charity for which we largely exist. The great difficulty I see before the Isle of Axholme is that you will have to live up to your past traditions. Such loyal support of charities has been given by you in the past, in addition to the local calls and claims, that their might be some difficulty in living up to the high standard of the past. The old idea of Freemasonry amongst a certain class was "much eating and drinking and late hours;" but the most modern and correct idea was, that the Order existed to help forward and augment the work of the church, and to aid every good and charitable work. No man could become a Mason unless he held a good social position, but unfortunately in this keen competitive age adverse circumstances and misfortune overtook many a Brother, through circumstances over which he had not the slightest control. It was then the duty of his Brethren to be true to their principles of Brotherly love and give a helping hand. The succour of the widow and fatherless was a work dear to every true Mason's heart, and the two excellent Institutions in London existed solely for the purpose of educating, feeding, and clothing the children of deceased Masons. Several hundred boys and girls were being fitted and prepared for the battle of life that they might hold situations, and make such a position for themselves in life as they would most likely have held, had misfortune not overtaken them.

Great praise is due to Brother T. Staniforth, the Charity Steward, who had worked with might and main to secure such a large collection of goods, &c.; and which up to the present has resulted in securing for the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls the sum of £50. This amount will be added to when remainder of goods are sold.—"Doncaster Gazette."

On Thursday next, 9th inst., the Symbols of the Craft degrees in Freemasonry will be expounded by Bro. James Stevens P.M. P.Z., &c., with limelight diagrams by Bro. Walter Clement Tyler S.D. 862, at the regular meeting of the Duke of Edinburgh Lodge of Instruction, No. 1259, at the Eastern Hotel, Commercial Road, Limehouse. SILVER WEDDING PRESENTATION.

A MASSIVE solid silver punch-bowl was presented on Friday, 13th ult., to Dr. and Mrs. Williams Cock, of Peckham, on the occasion of the celebration of their silver wedding. The gift, subscribed for at a few days' notice only, and confined to members of the Masonic fraternity connected with the Rye Lodge and Rye Chapter (of both of which Dr. Cock was a founder), is a handsome and valuable evidence of the high regard and hearty affection in which he is deservedly held, not only by his Masonic friends but also by all who have the privilege of his acquaintance. The intrinsic worth of this offering is after all only a slight indication of the degree of admiration and respect entertained for him as "a man and a Mason" by the leading inhabitants of the neighbourhood, while the spontaneous support and cordial spirit with which the presentation was sprung as a total surprise upon the unsuspecting recipient speaks well for the worthy way in which the secrets of the Craft are kept by its votaries. The bowl, which is of a rich, yet chaste Jacobean design, bears an appropriate inscription.—"South London Press."

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

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

ROYAL MASONIC INSTITUTION FOR BOYS.

THE regular Monthly Council was held on Friday, 27th December, at Freemasons' Hall, Bro. Richard Eve in the chair, and there were also present Brothers Keyser Treasurer, Lefeuvre, Fitzgerald, Glass, Fairchild, Strachan, McQueen, Pulman, Cummings, Stephens, and Mickley.

After the usual routine business, the report of the Petitions Committee was considered. Eleven Petitions were accepted and two deferred. Two cases were rejected, one on the ground that as the boy was born twenty-one years after the Father had ceased to be a subscribing Mason it could not be considered as

coming within the objects of the Institution. It was incidentally mentioned that a Petition on behalf of the sister of the Candidate was similarly rejected by the General Committee of the Girls School on the previous day.

The List for the April election was then closed with fifty-one Candidates, and the Quarterly Court was recommended to elect twenty-eight Boys therefrom.

A grant of £10 was made for an ex-pupil's advancement.

In the report of the proceedings of the Board of Management it was named that a satisfactory report of the Examination of the whole School by the Syndicate of the Cambridge University had been received. This report we shall reproduce next week, it being crowded out from our current issue.

BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION.

We tender our hearty congratulations to the Secretary and others interested in the work, on the good fortune that appears to be in store for the Fund.

The installation meeting of the Domatic Lodge, No. 177, will be held on Friday next, at Anderton's Hotel, Fleet Street, Bro. Thomas Henry Hobbs being the W.M.-elect. In addition to the installation there is a full agenda of business, one Brother coming forward for the second degree, three gentlemen being candidates for initiation, and one Brother desiring to be admitted as a joining member. We hope to give an account of the meeting in due course.

The old Prince's Street Hall, thirty years ago one of two rooms which alone could hold concert parties in Penzance, since used as a billiard-room, is now very much changed and improved. The ground floor has light admitted, and will be made available for Masonic banquets. The stairs to the first floor have been widened and improved. These now lead to a Lodge Room for the Mount Sinai Freemasons. It is forty feet long, twenty-six feet wide, and twenty-five feet high, and will make a fine Lodge. The second floor has a hall of less size, with ante-rooms, &c., and will be devoted to Arch Masonry.—"Western Mercury."

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There are a variety of opinions on the law of degrees adopted by Grand Lodge of Scotland at the meeting in November, says "The Mallet," in "Glasgow Evening News," the two principal of which are that the law comes into force at once, and the other that it does not become law until the minutes are confirmed at the next meeting of Grand Lodge. The result is that one finds one Lodge acting on the rule, and another trusting to the more convenient opinion, and, therefore, conducting their work on the old lines. We have only to go back to the time when the fees were increased in proof of the contention that laws come into force from the moment they are passed. So far as the claim that the laws do not come into operation until the minutes of the meeting of Grand Lodge at which they were adopted are confirmed is concerned, a glance at Grand Lodge rule 42 at once disposes of that. "Confirmation of minutes of Grand Lodge implies that the *res gesta* of a previous meeting has been correctly recorded, and not that the questions discussed and disposed of at such former meeting can be opened up at the succeeding one when the minutes are read."

"A SPRIG OF ACACIA."

AT the funeral of Dr. W. L. Pope, at Highweek, the Freemasons were represented by members of Devon Lodge, of which Dr. Pope was Chaplain, and by Bro. Snelling.

THE death occurred on the 30th ult. of Bro. Edward Bath, Town Clerk of Glastonbury, whose loss to the public life of Glastonbury will be almost irreparable, and will be keenly felt in many ways for a long time. The Mayor of Wells, at a meeting of the Council, sympathetically alluded to the loss Glastonbury had suffered.

THE remains of Bro. Henry Thomas Hardy, of Southampton, who occupied a distinguished position in the Albert Edward Chapter, and died on 21st ult., at the comparatively early age of forty-one years, were interred on the 24th, in the Southampton Cemetery, his remains being followed to the grave by a number of Brethren.
