FESTIVAL OF THE GIRLS SCHOOL.

WHEN we said we hoped that the result of the Festival of the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls would be to add another to the already long list of triumphs secured by the Masonic Brethren of England, in support of the Charitable Educational Institutions associated with their Order, we little thought what was in store for the Craft when the announcement came to be made on Wednesday; and we think there were very few Brethren, outside those who actually knew the state of affairs, who, even on the morning of the Festival, would have pinned their faith on a total exceeding £15,000, but as a matter of fact that sum was very considerably exceeded, the amount announced by Bro. Hedges Secretary of the Institution being no less than £21,045—that is, £3,000 in excess of any previous total, save that of the Centenary Festival, secured by a Board of Stewards totalling 547 Ladies and Brethren—103 in advance of any previous record, with the one exception just referred to.

Words fail us to express our surprise at this grand contribution, so far in advance of what was expected and, may we say it, in advance of what is really required, unless the Committee contemplate some departure from the policy of the past. There is such a thing as being killed by kindness, and really our Educational Institutions seem to be running a fearful risk of coming to some such an end, and unless something is done to put matters on a more equitable basis than exists at the present time the results may be far more serious than many imagine.

As the Treasurer of the Institution said in response to the toast of the evening, this splendid contribution from the Craft of England will remove all anxiety as to the current year's expenses, and will allow of a substantial addition to the invested capital of the Institution, which latter will no doubt be increased to one hundred thousand pounds, or more, as the result of this year's surplus income. This is a very nice amount to have put away for the future, but what will be its ultimate fate? So large a sum ready for disposal is a standing menace, and we should never be surprised to hear a proposal made to squander it in the erection of costly new buildings, just as the Craft has lately had an experience of in another direction.

We have recently pointed out the all but impossible task set anyone who desires to win for a child a home in one or other of the Schools of English Freemasonry, and there are many who feel even stronger on the point than we do, and yet in spite of it all the money flows in as we have seen it during the last few days, and it seems now absolutely necessary for the Committee to adopt some new measures of spending it. Will they do so in that most wasteful of all ways -the purchase of bricks and mortar, or will they find some method of conferring the benefits of a good education in a less costly way than is now rendered

necessary at our Schools-costly we mean in the matter of accommodation? Why not devote the interest on the £100,000 invested capital to providing education and clothing for children at their own homes? It works well in other quarters, but may not be quite so showy as large educational establishments of princely magnificence.

As already stated, the figures announced by the Secretary were: LONDON, 265 Stewards, £10,990; PROVINCES, &c., 282 Stewards, £10,055; a total of

547 Stewards, bringing up £21,045.

THE BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION.

THE annual meeting of the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution for Aged Freemasons and Widows will be held on Friday next, at 12 o'clock at noon, at the Freemasons' Tavern, Great Queen Street, London.

According to the programme announced at the time of the issue of the voting papers fifteen Brethren and twelve Widows are to be elected, but at the meeting of the Committee of Management held on Wednesday it was decided to increase this number by the creation of eight new Annuities, five for Aged Brethren, of £40 each; and three for Widows, of £32

This will raise the number to be elected to twenty and fifteen respectively, and in addition there will be the vacancies caused by death to be filled, so that altogether a goodly number of the candidates eligible for election will be admitted on Friday next. May they one and all live many years to enjoy the bounty of their Masonic Brethren.

I paid a visit on Tuesday to the Hampden Lodge of Freemasons, whereof Bro. Thomas Moss, B.A., is Master, and which meets at that admirable residential club, the Hampden, in Phænix Street. The Hampden Lodge is one of the most flourishing of the North London Lodges, just as the club is one of the most successful of its kind, for it has over 200 residential members who have the luxuries of a good hotel as well as an up-to-date club. MARK MASONRY.

GLOUCESTERSHIRE AND HEREFORDSHIRE.

N interesting gathering in connection with Mark Masonry A took place on Friday of last week, when the annual meeting of this Provincial Grand Lodge was made coincident with the Consecration of a new Lodge at Ross. The ceremonies took place in the Corn Exchange of the town, a building well suited to the purpose, affording as it did ample accommodation for certainly the largest assemblage of members of the Order yet held in the Province.

Outside Ross there were, until Friday, five Lodges in the Province, viz., at Cheltenham (Cheltenham and Keystone, No. 10), Berkeley (Lygrove, No. 218), Hereford (St. Ethelbert, No. 243), Cinderford (Royal Forest of Dean, No. 340), and Gloucester (Gloucester, No. 439), and each of these Lodges was numerously represented, notwithstanding the difficulty of access from the southern part of the extensive Province. It may be mentioned that Gloucestershire was constituted a Province just twenty years ago, and then comprised three of Province just twenty years ago, and then comprised three of the now existing Lodges. The first Provincial Grand Master was the late Rev. C. Raikes Davy, of Bath. He was followed in succession by the late Bro. John Walker, M.A., of Chel-tenham, and Bro. the Baron de Ferrieres, the induction of the latter to the office being marked by the addition of the county of Hereford to the area of the Province under the joint name it now bears. It was by this amalgamation that the St. Ethelbert Lodge came within the Province. On the retirement of the Baron de Ferrieres, at the end of his three years term of office, in 1891, Bro. R. V. Vassar-Smith, the present Prov. Grand Master, was selected by the M. W. the Grand Master to succeed him, and he has been twice re-appointed for a term of three years. In 1892 the Gloucester Lodge was constituted, and the formation of a Lodge at Ross makes the civith Lodge in the Province.

makes the sixth Lodge in the Province.

The consecration of the Kyrle Lodge had precedence in the ceremonial of the day. It took place at 2, the Provincial Grand Master being the Consecrating Officer, under patent from the M.W. Grand Master the Prince of Wales, while the working Offices were filled by Prov.G. Lodge Officers. The ceremony in the Mark degree is very similar in ritual to that of a Craft consecration. Its impressiveness on this occasion, as, indeed, the effect of the proceedings throughout the day, was enhanced by the musical programme, arranged and conducted by Bro. F. Forty Prov.G.Org. The Consecrating Lodge having been opened, the hymn "Hail Eternal" was sung and prayer offered, and then, after various addresses incident to the ceremonial had been delivered, the Petition and Warrant were read and the Lodge was Consecrated and Constituted according to ancient usage. The strewing of

Corn, the emblem of Plenty; the pouring of Wine, the emblem of Joy and Happiness; and of Oil, the emblem of Unity; and the sprinkling of Salt, the emblem of Friendship, were incidents of the ritual to which added effect was given by the reading of appropriate passages from God's Word, and by choral accompaniment. The ceremony was brought to a close by the singing of a hymn, and by the patriarchal benediction.

The installation of the first Master of the Lodge and the appointment of his Officers followed. Bros. F. S. Collins P.M. 243, T. Matthews, and G. F. Minett had been designated in the Warrant respectively as W.M., and Senior and Junior Wardens, and they were placed in their chairs in due

The Kyrle Lodge having been closed, an interval took place, during which the Brethren partook of tea at the Royal Hotel, and enjoyed the view of lovely Wye scenery to be had from the Hotel grounds.

At 5 o'clock Provincial Grand Lodge was held, the Prov. G. Master in the chair, supported by his Deputy Bro.

Orlando Shellard.

The business of Prov. G. Lodge was of a routine character, the only exception being a reference to the death of the late Earl of Lathom, which event was made the subject of a resolution to which the Prov.G. Master and Bro. the Rev. C. J. Martyn spoke in sympathetic terms. The call of the Lodges showed that nearly a hundred members were present, and the Lodge reports were financially and otherwise satisfactory. The new Kyrle Lodge had, it was stated, started with a membership of 28, nearly all of whom were present.

SOUTH WALES.

N Monday, 24th ult., Sir Edward Stock Hill, K.C.B., M.P., was installed as Provincial Grand Mark Master, at the Masonic Temple, Cardiff. The ceremony was performed by the Right Hon. the Earl of Euston Pro Grand Master, and there were also present at the ceremony Bro.W. W. B. Beach Deputy Grand Master, Bro. Alan de Tatton Egerton Prov. G.M. Cheshire, together with other Grand Officers.

The history of Mark Masonry in South Wales extends back over very many years, and up to 1869 the Lodge established at Cardiff worked under the Royal Arch Chapter of Scotland. In that year, however, it transferred its allegiance to the English Grand Mark Lodge. It was not until 1880, however, that a Provincial Grand Lodge was formed for the southern half of the Principality, and this was placed under the rule of the Grand Registrar of England. The first meeting of this Lodge took place at Cardiff on 19th April 1880, and in the following year Sir Pryse-Pryse, of Gogerddan, was appointed by the Prince of Wales as Master of the Province, and Bro. N. D. Marks, of Cardiff, was appointed Provincial Grand Secretary, a position which he has held to this day. Bro. Sir Edward Stock Hill, K.C.B., M.P., succeeds Sir Pryse-Pryse, so that a similar event to that which took place on Monday has not happened in South Wales for nineteen years. In addition to the installation of Sir Edward Stock Hill, there was another interesting ceremony, viz., the recognition of Bro. Robt. Lock P.P.S.G.W., as Prov. Grand Senior Warden in charge of the Province.

"A SPRIG OF ACACIA."

A MID every demonstration of respect the mortal remains of Bro. Wm. Miles were placed in their last resting place at the Cemetery, at Woodbridge, on Wednesday afternoon, 3rd inst. Business was suspended at several of the principal establishments, while at private houses blinds were drawn, and the inhabitants generally testified to the high place which the deceased occupied in their affections and esteem. Bro. Wm. Miles, as a worthy successor to the late Mr. John Grout in the proprietorship of the Bull Hotel, and of the choice stud of hackneys of a class which have made the Bull Hotel stables famous at home and abroad, had done much for the town in which he had resided so long, and it was fitting that the residents of the town and the neighbourhood should testify to the prominent place he occupied in their affections and confidence. The late Bro. Miles was an ardent member of the Masonic body, and accordingly the members of the Doric Lodge, No. 81 (of which the deceased was Worshipful Master in 1897) attended in full regalia, a special dispensation having been granted by the Provincial Grand Master Lord Henniker for the Brethren to attend in Masonic clothing. There was a choral service at the church, the rector, the Rev. T. Housecroft officiating. The remainder of the service was read by the Rector, who, before pronouncing the Benediction, as Chaplain of the Doric Lodge of Freemasons, addressed the Brethren in terms appropriate to the solemn occasion. He said: Having paid the last tribute of respect to the remains of our departed Brother, it is left for us to keep in memory his characteristic virtues. Had he lived till to-morrow, it would have been the eleventh anniversary of his membership, and in about eight years he had reached the highest position in the Lodge, a tribute at once of the high esteem and respect in which he was held by the Brethren. The same virtues that marked and brought about his success in Freemasonry also characterised his private and public life, and because he had lived up to the principles of a Mason he made himself beloved and highly principles of a Mason he made himself beloved and highly respected. He was a good husband, kind father, and generous employer. His acts of charity, carried out unostentatiously, were the marks of a true Mason. His good nature and hospitality were well known, and especially to be admired were his singleness of purpose and simplicity of character. During his long and trying illness he never failed in his high purpose, and now we believe that having passed safely under God's protection through the valley of the shadow of death, he will finally rise from this tomb of transgression, and shine he will finally rise from this tomb of transgression, and shine as the stars for ever and ever. At the conclusion of the service the Masons' tribute of respect—a sprig of acacia—and sprigs of thyme by the Oddfellows, were dropped into the grave.

WIDELY respected and a much beloved and promising young Freemason has just passed away in the person of Brother George Hemmens, who entered the Grand Lodge above on Wednesday, 3rd inst. He was only twenty-four years of age, when "God's finger touched him and he slept," and it is a matter of sincere regret that he will be known to us no more in this world. His love for Freemasonry began in youth, and at the earliest possible moment he was initiated in the Colston Lodge, No. 610, in the Province of Bristol; in which Lodge his late respected father had been initiated

before him. So early was his entrance into Freemasonry, that if our memory is accurate, we believe the twenty-first anniversary of his birth came between the time of proposition and the day of initiation. The appreciative regard he inherited and evinced for Freemasonry amounted to a loving veneration, for he found its teachings congenial to his mind, and its principles suited and adapted to his nature. delighted in Craft Masonry, and was a regular attendant as far as health and circumstances would permit. He was particularly fond of the working in the Mark degree, to which he was advanced in Lodge Lyegrove, No. 218, in the Province of Gloucestershire. During the short time he worked in the latter degree he rose to some distinction, and held the office of Deacon at the time of his death. Young, active and energetic, he became a good all-round athlete, and was a smart and successful figure in the football and cricket fields, and the winning of more than one match has been indebted to his aid. In politics, he was a staunch Conservative, and his father and Bro. Sir Edward S. Hill Provincial Grand Master for South Wales were fast friends. He found, or rather made time to become an efficient member of found, or rather made time to become an efficient member of the Artillery Volunteer Corps, and here his genial manner was much appreciated by his comrades. He was a sound Churchman, and evinced a lively interest in the church of his parish, where his father had served as warden for many years. By the early departure of our Brother we are reminded that no sooner do we begin life, than death begins to follow us, borne on the wings of time, whose scythe is ever cutting short our strings of moments. Bro. Hemmens was in the skilful professional hands of Dr. Wallace and Dr. Mitchell-Clarke, and on his proceeding to Bournemouth Mitchell-Clarke, and on his proceeding to Bournemouth some months ago he was attended by Dr. Love. There he stayed with Bro. Evans, at the Granville Hotel, and there he received every kindness and every attention that was possible. At Bournemouth he passed away. The insiduous disease, tuberculosis, had marked him for her own, and we only know that he lived respected and died regretted—died as all nature dies and lives again, showing that this world is but the tilling ground of Heaven. "The briefer life the earlier immortality!" Let the sprig of acacia which has been placed in the right hand of our Brother, who has gone before, tend to remind us as our Masonic teachings ever do, of the frailty of man, and the humanity of all things. Among the Masonic jewels of our departed Brother were to be found friendship, morality and brotherly love, and by these pure eminations of earthly goodness he will be long and affectionately remembered. It has been the pleasure of the Almighty Architect to call him hence, and he has become "Like the stars by day, withdrawn from mortal eye; but not extinct, he holds his way, in glory through the sky." Let our compassion and condolence, like the acacia, drop tenderly and sympathetically towards the mother of our good friend, and to his sister, and to that dear sister who was to have been his wife; may they and other near and dear relatives receive that comfort and consolation which it is not in the power of earthly hands or minds to bestow or impart. The tolling of the bell of St. Paul's, Bedminster, on Monday afternoon, announced the sad intelligence that the mortal remains of our young Brother were about to be laid to rest. The first part of the ceremony was held at St. Paul's, Bedminster, where the procession was met at the Church door by the Rev. J. H. Ellaby (the officiating clergyman), Mr. C. Ball (ex-churchwarden), Mr. Churchwarden Gardiner, Mr. Churchwarden Evans, and other officers. A large number of people had gathered both in the body and gallery of the Church. After the solemn strains of the organ had died away, the beautiful hymn "Brief life is here our portion," was sung, and the first part of the Church service was impressively gone through. The procession re-formed and proceeded to Arno's Vale Cemetery, procession re-formed and proceeded to Arno's Vale Cemetery, where the Rev. Ellaby with much feeling conducted the concluding part of the service. The removal of the violet embroidered pall disclosed a coffin of polished oak, with a brass breastplate bearing the inscription:—"George Henry Hemmens, died 3rd of May 1899, aged twenty-four years." After the body had been consigned to the grave, numerous Brethren, in passing to view the coffin for the last time, dropped in their sprig of acacia, among them being Bros. Ireland, J. W. Stone, H. J. Savery, A. E. Denby, T. Neale, C. H. Harding, J. Owner P.M. 610. Not only was the coffin covered with wreaths, crosses and other emblems in choice white flowers, but the top of the open funeral-car was choice white flowers, but the top of the open funeral-car was also covered, and these must serve in some faint measure to express the esteem in which Bro. 

FESTIVAL OF THE GIRLS SCHOOL.

THE 111th Anniversary Festival of the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls was held on Wednesday, at Freemasons' Tavern, Great Queen Street, the resources of the large establishment, and of Messrs. Spiers and Pond the present lessees, being taxed to the utmost by the exceptionally large attendance of Stewards, a fact which is made all the more apparent when we record the necessity which arose to provide an overflow room, the large Hall of the Tavern being insufficient to accommodate all who desired to attend in support of the Chairman of the year.

The Right Hon. Viscount Dungarvan Provincial Grand Master of Somersetshire presided, and was immediately supported by the Earl of Warwick Deputy G.M. England Prov. G.M. Essex, the Earl of Euston Prov. G.M. Norths and Hunts, the Grand Secretary, and many others of distinction in the Craft.

At the conclusion of the bauquet the Chairman proposed the toast of the Queen. They were all delighted to find that Her Majesty had returned from abroad in good health, and they were all looking forward to the celebration of another birthday in the glorious reign of the Sovereign.

The next toast was that of H.R.H. the Prince of Walcs, K.G., Most Worshipful Grand Master Grand Patron and President of the Institution; the Princess of Wales Grand Patroness, and the other Members of the Royal Family, and in proposing it Viscount Dungarvan said no one had shown a deeper interest in the Masonic Institutions than His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. He had presided at the Centenary Festival of that Institution, and they well remembered how ably he officiated at the similar celebration in connection with the Boys Institution.

In submitting the toast of the Grand Officers the Chairman said it was always a pleasure to drink to the health of the Pro Grand Master. In reference to the Deputy Grand Master, the present was the first opportunity Lord Warwick had had of being present at a Masonic Festival in his present capacity, and he had told him how pleased he

The Earl of Warwick said on behalf of the Grand Officers of England he returned the most sincere thanks for the toast. He was especially grateful for the opportunity of meeting the Brethren for the first time since he had had the honour of occupying the high position which the Most Worshipful the Grand Master had conferred upon him. Although for the past seventeen or eighteen years he had been intimately associated with Freemasonry in Essex, and since his Oxford days had been an active Mason, he felt his new honour would bring him more in touch with the Brethren of the country. On the present occasion they saw many Grand Officers present, and very rightly so, as the present was one of those occasions when Grand Officers should muster in force, for where they not Masons in great measure for purposes of charity. There could be no doubt about one thing—education was one of those subjects about which opinions differed, but the Masons of England were desirous their pupils should have the very best education it was in their power to bestow, and they hardly minded what it cost them. He hoped the Grand Officers of England might very often meet on such occasions as the present.

The Chairman proposed the toast of success to the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls. Now that the Centenary of the two Educational Institutions was over there could be no cause for jealousy. He thought that at the present moment, when so many Institutions were soriously put to it to provide funds with which to carry on their work, it was gratifying that they, as Freemasons, could point with pleasure to what they were doing, and say it was hardly the case with them. It was a great credit to the Royal Masonic Institution where they took part, and he asked those present—if they had not already visited the Institution—to go and see for themselves what was being done there, and they would then wonder, as he had done, whether the happiest person there was the recipient of the Charity of the Craft, or the donor.

Bro. Terry Secretary of the Benevolent Institution was heartly called for, and in responding said he had not the slightest idea he would be called upon to respond to the toast, but he was very pleased of the opportunity of offering his congratulations to the Girls School on the most gratifying result of the Festival of the year. That day, at the Committee meeting of the Benevolent Institution, it had been decided, in consequence of the great success that had attended the Festival held in February last, to add five Aged Brethren and three Widows to the number of annuitants benefitted by the Institution for all time. It must be a gratification to them all to know that this increase of nearly £300 a year was possible, beyond the total of £16,630 previously required for Annuities alone, without anything for working expenses.
